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A message from the leader



As we approach the end of the year. I wanted to reflect on recent events. Over the last six months, South Norfolk has been at the forefront of our national media for the infrastructure projects proposed or happening in our district. While some of these are long fought for improvements, like the construction of the Long Stratton bypass, which is well underway and will improve the quality of life for our residents, others are not.

South Norfolk has always been a supporter of planned housing growth, promoting new homes for local residents, and making sure that infrastructure is delivered alongside that

growth. We also understand the need to support green energy, but there must be a balance.

We need to conserve the environment and promote energy security, but not at any cost and the Council continues to strongly oppose plans for huge pylons bisecting our beautiful countryside. It's just not right that National Grid are prepared to bury their cables in Essex, and put them offshore in Kent, but not in Norfolk. We cannot let our county become a second class citizen to the Home Counties.

And now we hear of new applications, for thousands of acres of solar panels across our landscape. The final decision for which will not be decided locally by South Norfolk residents, but in Whitehall.

So, I challenge the government to consider three things: First, how sympathetic are these solar farms to the rural character? Will they really enclose entire villages?

Second, how will food security be impacted. Food production is a vital part of the Norfolk economy, and we need to support our farmers. Finally, what, if any will be the benefits for local residents and communities? Will there be discounts on electricity bills and what about those businesses who even now. can't get a grid connection? South Norfolk must not become a battery for London.

South Norfolk Council will always support our communities, whether it's fighting and winning the Deal Farm appeal, or the amazing work done through our Help Hub, looking after our most vulnerable residents. We know that this can be a difficult time for some, and I am proud that our services can and will support those who need a helping hand.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a very happy Christmas and a wonderful New Year.

It will help us recruit additional volunteer responders, purchase additional kit, equipment and uniforms and most importantly allow us to continue as a group. We soon hope to be in a position to purchase a Raizer 2 lifting chair that allows a responder, after training, to help a patient who has fallen.

Councils win Gold in **RSPCA PawPrints Awards**

We are very proud to announce that we have been awarded the Gold standard in the RSPCA **PawPrints Awards.**

This prestigious honour highlights our continued efforts to provide exceptional animal welfare services across the district.

The RSPCA PawPrints Awards. the only scheme of its kind, celebrates local authorities and public bodies for their

pioneering work in animal welfare across England and Wales.

We were awarded the Gold standard for the work done by our stray dog team.

We have secured a deal to replace existing septic tanks with private package treatment plants, at no upfront cost to homeowners.

This has been made possible due to a partnership between our company, Norfolk Environmental Credits, and Norfolk Rivers Consortium.

These upgrades will significantly reduce nutrient leakage into the environment, a critical step in safeguarding Norfolk's environment, its rivers and local ecosystems.

South Norfolk Cabinet member for Environmental Excellence, Cllr Keith Kiddie said:

"Every home generates nutrients from daily activities, such as flushing the toilet or using the dishwasher and untreated wastewater can harm our waterways. Our collaboration with NRC allows homeowners to upgrade their systems to more environmentally friendly options while contributing to the overall health of our natural resources."

The conversion process will generate a nutrient credit, which can be sold to housebuilders needing to offset additional nutrients from new

developments. Homeowners will also benefit from this scheme, making it a win-win for both residents and the environment.

Homeowners are required to maintain the new systems according to manufacturer recommendations, with the first two years of servicing covered by NRC. Homeowners will also enter into a legal agreement ensuring compliance for 90 years, including binding future property owners.

This initiative, supported by a loan from the Norfolk Mitigation Fund, underscores the commitment of NEC, whose shareholders also include Breckland Council. Broadland District Council and North Norfolk District Council, and its partners to sustainable housing solutions that benefit both communities and the environment.

The Council is working with Wymondham Town Council to invest nearly £1 million to improve the market town's centre and surrounding areas. The money is coming from matched funding from both councils of £250,000 plus the proceeds from the sale of the old town council offices which South Norfolk Council owned.

Cabinet Member Cllr Lisa Overton-Neal said: "It's really good news that so many residents have already had their say on what we can do to improve Wymondham town centre. People's

relationship with the high street has changed and it's vitally important that we invest in the town to support local businesses and future proof Wymondham's high street."

Cllr Suzanne Nuri-Nixon, Wymondham Town Mayor and District Councillor said:

"Wymondham is a marvellous market town with a variety of businesses coupled with a vibrant and irrepressible community spirit. The new Public Realm project from South Norfolk, in partnership with the Town Council, will seek to add to that vibrancy and keep Wymondham a favoured destination for residents and visitors alike."

Both Councils have been asking local residents and

businesses how best to spend the money and how local people think Wymondham town centre can be improved. To make sure local residents had an opportunity to have their say, and share their views, the Council funded a public consultation.

To help us plan the next steps, the two councils asked residents how they currently use Wymondham town centre, and the issues and opportunities that it presents. The feedback received will now be used when it comes to the design part of the project.

Following the initial consultation, we are now moving forward to produce concept designs for the town centre with another consultation on these designs being held early next year.





When two businesses made plans to diversify, Business Builder grants helped them make it happen faster.

Pulham Patch, near Long Stratton, is well known for its amazing maze, but that works for only a few months each year.

To offer visitors a much better value day out, and grow their business, the Pulham Patch team planned a diversification project. Thanks to a Rural Capital Grant from our Business

Builder programme, they commissioned a large 'combine harvester' as a centrepiece for the new play area, in time for the busy summer season.

Constructed mainly out of wood, it was designed to fit in with the rustic farm setting and give children something exciting to play on.

Annelise Easton of Pulham Patch confirmed: "Every time we add a new offer, like the wild flower picking meadow or this play area, we are giving visitors more and we are making our business more resilient. Without the grant, the combine harvester would have had to wait for at least another year."

Cabinet member, Lisa Overton-Neal said:

"In the 24 months since Business Builder launched, we have helped businesses across South Norfolk with grants, as well as offered free advice and training to start ups. We're encouraging entrepreneurs and supporting businesses to be more competitive. This leads to better local employment opportunities and strengthens our local economy, which is positive for everyone in our district."

Branching into solar panel cleaning

If sensitive solar panels become dirty, they can lose up to 40% of their output, which means lost energy and money.






Love Local this Christmas

Membership is open to anyone who is part of a voluntary, community, or social enterprise sector including a wide range of groups, from traditional organisations like Girl Guides and Rotary Clubs to newer initiatives like Community Fridges and Men's Sheds. Over the last 10 years, we have led the way in bringing together partners from across the public and voluntary sectors to improve our residents' health and wellbeing. Intervening earlier to prevent issues from escalating.

We know there are vulnerable people in our communities who find it difficult to ask for help and that is why we do not wait for people to come to us.

Our Community Connectors are "local people" working at a grass-root level, using local knowledge to help residents access support. They meet residents in an informal setting – the school playground, libraries and community groups and are a trusted link to our health and social care services.

Nearly 20% of patients visit their GP with problems that are primarily social issues. Our Social Prescribing initiative works to reduce some of the pressures on the NHS, by addressing these non-medical needs, looking at the causes of problems and offering residents tangible help and support.

Our social prescribing service began with Community Connectors covering two GP surgeries. Today there are 26 Community Connectors dealing with 1,000 referrals a month. The team now covers 43 doctors' surgeries, which is almost half the GPs in Norfolk.

We also understand how important it is for recovery, for people to stay in their own home. We recognised that patients leaving hospital were not receiving the support they needed and we started working directly with the hospital discharge hub to get people home as soon as possible and prevent re-admissions.

Since April 2021 we have had 7000 referrals to help a patient get home or to help prevent admission from the NNUH and Hellesdon hospitals. Together, we have opened up 49,000 bed days – delivering a massive saving of over £39 million to the NHS.

Preventing falls

The way we use technology is changing the way we provide support for our residents. We can now identify residents most at risk of a fall and we are working with them to put in preventative measures.

Those at risk are offered support, ranging from exercise classes, connections to local groups and small adaptions around the house. We have already seen a reduced number of falls and have helped people make positive changes to prepare themselves as they get older.

Community stars shine at awards night

Over 100 people joined us at a special evening at Bawburgh Golf Club, celebrating local volunteers at our Community Awards.

Council Chair, Cllr Sharon Blundell, expressed pride in all those who were nominated, she said: "We received over 100 exceptional nominations, making the short-listing process very difficult. Every nominee should take great pride in the positive impact they have made in their local communities.

"It's truly inspiring to see so many dedicated individuals in our district who generously give up their time to help others. Hearing their stories, makes me proud to be part of this community. I'd also like to thank the council officers for organising this fantastic event."

Volunteers spend countless hours helping others, raising

money for charity, organising events, running clubs and community facilities.

"Opening soon

We are delighted to announce that our Swim Centre in Diss will reopen on Monday 13 January.

We are really looking forward to welcoming you back and showcasing the improvements that have been made to the centre, future-proofing the facility for generations to come.

Cabinet member, Cllr Kim Carsok said:

"This is really exciting news and, while other councils are being forced to cut back on their leisure provision, I'm very proud that we have recognised how important it is to help our residents stay fit and healthy. I'm also proud that we can now continue to teach hundreds of children to swim every year.

"We've made the choice to support our residents and, having already invested in our leisure facilities in Wymondham and Long Stratton, the first part of our plan for Diss is now complete."

The improvement and refurbishment work included:

- Re-shaping and re-tiling the swimming pool area
- Expanding and improving changing rooms
- Improving the entrance lobby and reception
- Creating a new pool viewing area

The £4 million improvements were helped by securing £1.2m of Public Sector Decarbonisation Scheme funding from central government to reduce the carbon footprint of the leisure centre. This included installing air source heat pumps, new building cladding and insulation and solar panels on the roof.

These changes will go a long way to helping us achieve our net zero carbon emissions goal

£150,000 for community projects

Sixteen projects that will benefit the community have received a share of £150,000 from our Community **Action Fund.**

The panel met earlier this year to consider a range of largescale projects from across the district.

Chair of the panel, Cllr Kim Carsok, said:

"There's a real energy and desire from volunteers and community groups in South Norfolk to develop, improve and upgrade local facilities, which will have a direct impact on our residents' physical and mental wellbeing. I'm pleased we could support so many projects and look forward to working alongside our volunteers to make South Norfolk an even better place to live.

"Sadly, we could not fund all the applications, but our Communities Team will support unsuccessful applicants in sourcing other funding routes."

The Council's Community Action Fund grants are designed to work alongside funding from other sources and organisations in order to enable the bigger projects to take shape.

The grants are also intended to help projects become self-sustaining so that they can be of benefit to the local communities not only now but for many years to come.

Smaller grants are also available form South Norfolk Council with each Councillor having £1,000 to help support projects in their ward.

Supporting Dawn's New Horizon 17

Local charity, Dawn's New Horizon, has received £15,000 from Broadland and South Norfolk District **Councils to support victims** of domestic abuse.

The funding, provided through our Pride in Place and Employability grants, will pay for a counsellor to support newly rehoused victims of domestic abuse across Broadland and South Norfolk.

Cabinet Member, Graham MInshull, said: "By working alongside the amazing Dawn's New Horizon and our other partners, we can offer this much-needed home-based support, during what can be a very dangerous and highly stressful time."

"Breaking free of domestic abuse is incredibly difficult and we want survivors to feel supported and safe, while ensuring that they can access all the services and resources they need, to regain autonomy of their lives."

Dawn's New Horizon has helped scores of people cope with the effects of domestic abuse, offering information and support over the phone, online and face to face.

Founder Dame Lorraine Curston said: "Our service is bespoke to the individual and their needs. We support and empower clients as they take back control of their life. This service has proven successful in the short time we have been

providing one-to-one sessions within the safety of the client's home.

"Speaking with individuals, they have given feedback about the service, stating that 'it's been life changing'. They now have a greater understanding around relationships, boundaries, their self-worth and have a better idea of who they are and where they want to be in the future."

Since 2022, Saffron Housing have recorded 190 addresses in Broadland and South Norfolk where a member of that household has experienced domestic abuse. In just two months (December 2023/ January 2024), Saffron was involved in providing advice and support to 18 tenants in the two districts.

Cllr Minshull added: "Unfortunately domestic abuse can happen to anyone. Please, if you, or anyone you know

is being affected by domestic abuse, seek help immediately."

Anvone affected by Domestic Abuse is urged to contact Dawn's New Horizon on 07854 044680, or ring Norfolk Integrated Domestic Abuse Service (NIDAS) on 03005 610555. People in immediate danger should call the police.

Residents of Broadland and South Norfolk can access the new counselling scheme by completing the Councils' Help Hub Request for Support form. The Councils also offer a sanctuary scheme which helps survivors of domestic abuse stav in their own homes, close to their support networks.

Getting Creative with Pride in Place

Our Pride in Place grants are making a big impact on the lives of residents, bringing people together and fostering a sense of pride within the community.

Clear Company CIC received a grant to help transform Wymondham's Abbey Schoolroom into the Little Norfolk Shop & Studio — a creative space where artists and the community can come together to combat isolation and boost wellbeing.

Founder Julie Briggs, a mental health advocate, said: "Many people experiencing mental illness are quite isolated. We wanted to set up a safe, warm and welcoming space where people could come and try things out, share common interests and improve people's wellbeing."

The social enterprise team opened the Little Norfolk Shop & Studio in December 2023

after running several successful pop-up events.

Local councillors Kevin Hurn and Robert Savage contributed £1,000 of their Ward Grants to equip the kitchen with a fridge freezer, dishwasher and large freezer. This was crucial for the running of the popular café which serves visitors locally-produced bakes and drinks.

The Pride in Place Grant helped to transform the dated interiors with brand new flooring. "This made a huge difference to the feel of the place and allowed us to run our yoga sessions." Said Julie.

In addition to a new floor, volunteers decorated the building with artwork, bunting, books and more to create a relaxed and bohemian atmosphere, where people can feel comfortable and free to express themselves.

There are a wide variety of activities on offer at the Schoolroom including a silent reading group, a sound café, cocktail workshops, an antenatal group, a ukelele group, yoga and mindfulness sessions, as well as bingo, art sessions and creative family workshops. One of our Go For it Grants helped pay for Slow Down Sundays — wellbeing activities run by Norfolk Psychology.

Cabinet Member, Cllr Kim Carsok said:

"The amount and variation of activities on offer at the Schoolroom is fantastic. Julie and her team are breaking down social barriers and bringing people from all walks of life together. They are tackling isolation and building upon the strong sense of community and belonging in Wymondham. I'm proud to be able to say we have supported this exceptional project."

Plans are now in motion to open a shop on the lower floor of the building, selling local art work and produce.

'Where's The Fly-tip', or WTF for short, is a campaign asking residents to report all incidents of fly-tipping that they witness and to send us any evidence



they have, including pictures. which might help identify the culprits.

The campaign has already proved successful with residents sending in reports and evidence of fly-tipping across the district.

To help us tackle what is a crime please follow the page facebook.com/WTFlytip/ and message the page with:

Where's The Fly-tip — to the best of your ability describe where the fly-tip has occurred.

What's the Fly-tip — send or upload a photo showing us, or briefly describe to us what has been fly-tipped.

Who's the Fly-tipper - let us know if you witnessed it happening, or if there could be clues as to who may have dumped it.

Householders are legally required to check that their waste will be disposed of correctly.

You must ask the person who is removing your waste where they intend to dispose of it, and you must also ask to see their waste carrier's license. If they're unable to provide one then, they may be disposing of your waste incorrectly and you could be held liable, and end up with a fixed penalty notice or even prosecution.

Recycle your tree and help a child

Every year East Anglia Children's Hospices run a Christmas tree recycling campaign. The charity encourages households in selected postcodes to register their Christmas tree and, in exchange for a donation, they will collect and recycle it. Last year the children's charity raised over £14,000 in Norfolk and is hoping, with your help, to build on that figure this year.

Wrapping paper

Do remove all tags, bows, ribbons and Sellotape and try the 'scrunch test'. If it stays in a ball once scrunched it can go into your recycling bin. Don't put it in recycling if it doesn't stay scrunched, pop it in your rubbish bin. If it's glittery or has foil on it, it can't be recycled.

Christmas crackers

Do separate your crackers out once you've used them. Any cardboard and paper can be recycled, if they don't have glitter or foil on them.

Don't put other items in the recycling bin, such as plastics, ribbons, any foil or glittery card, these need to go in your rubbish bin.

Food and takeaway plastic and foil containers

Do rinse any plastic food trays, pots, and foil containers, make sure they are dry and put them in your recycling bin.

Don't put dirty, food-stained containers in the recycling bin.

Glass bottles for water, drinks and wine

Do rinse glass bottles and jars, make sure they are dry, put the lids on, and put them in your recycling bin. Don't put wine or drinking glasses, or broken glass into recycling. It should be carefully wrapped and placed in your rubbish bin or taken to your nearest recycling centre.



Do take old electricals and batteries to a recycling centre or to shops that have a battery recycling point.

Don't put any electrical items or batteries in your rubbish or recycling bin. This can cause fires.

Old Christmas jumpers, textiles and shoes

Do put unwanted clothes or shoes in textile or shoe banks, or drop them off at your nearest recycling centre. Charity shops will be happy to receive clothes, shoes and textiles in good condition.

Don't put old clothes, shoes and textiles in your recycling bin.
