A message from the leader

While there were a small number of quite high localised spikes of covid infection in South Norfolk in October, the critical figure of hospital admissions has remained low, thanks to the high rates of covid vaccination in the district.

For those still to be jabbed, it's not too late. That also goes for youngsters of school age who have become eligible for the first time and older and more vulnerable residents who were vaccinated in January and for whom the beneficial effects will fade without a booster.

The jabs are an important reason why we're on the road to getting back to normal once more. I was proud of how our local Council looked after the most vulnerable in the midst of lockdowns, and how we sustained jobs and livelihoods with targetted support of local businesses that amounted to over £1m per week for every week of lockdown.

That's now in the past. We must look forward. And I am pleased that we're helping some of the smaller shops, pubs, restaurants and cafe's to get back on their feet with a shop-front refurbishment scheme. We're helping small businesses get trading online. And we have an exciting infrastructure investment in Harleston to improve the street scene with wider pavements while maintaining the number of on-street car park spaces.

As we look further ahead, we have plans to invest in more electric charging points in public areas and are also seeing how we can play our part in decarbonising the Broads to support the economy and enhance the environment of this internationally important wetland environment.

And all the time, we have a dedicated team empowered to

be flexible to support those for whom Covid has dealt a rotten hand. We are there to give practical and financial support to you or those you know who are at risk of rent-default, homelessness, personal debts or even to tide over whilst isolating at home.

My message is that we're planning positively for a post-carbon future but don't suffer in silence whilst we get there. Our help hub stands by on 01508 533633 to help you deal with hardship and life's headwinds so that everyone can play their part in the recovery.

Long Stratton Bypass backed by government

The Long Stratton Bypass has moved a significant step closer after the government confirmed vital funding for the project.

The Department for Transport has given a funding commitment of £26.2 million towards the cost of building the new road, which will cut congestion and support the local economy for many years to come.

Having
campaigned for
a bypass for Long
Stratton since 1997 I am
delighted that funding
has been agreed.

Councillor for Long Stratton, Alison Thomas said: "We have lobbied hard and the government has listened.

"Our role now will be to ensure the project is delivered within budget and timescales to improve the safety and well-being of all those living, working or travelling through Long Stratton. This is great news for the town's residents."

The A140 through Long Stratton is a pinch point that affects thousands of road users, and the people who live and work in Long Stratton, on a daily basis.

The bypass will cut congestion, help the local economy and vastly improve this regionally important route that links Norwich and Ipswich. The bypass is set to create hundreds of new jobs and homes, open up improvements for cycling and walking, and solve traffic and transport issues local people have been facing for more than a generation.

The proposed new A140 bypass will be a single carriageway that will provide a new junction

at Church Lane to the north, extending from this junction on the east side of Long Stratton going south for approximately 3.9km, where it will re-join the existing A140 near Oakside Farm.

The estimated overall cost of the bypass is £37.44m, with the remaining funding primarily sourced from local developer contributions and Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL).

Subject to receiving all of the necessary statutory approvals, including planning permission, the target date for work to start on construction is mid-2023, with the road open to traffic before the end of 2024.

We understand the vital importance of promoting and investing in our market towns and helping to support our vibrant local economy.

To continue our ongoing investment, residents of Harleston have been asked to give their views on a project to future proof their town centre. The £750,000 scheme focuses on reducing through-traffic, creating a better environment for shopping and providing places for residents and visitors to meet and enjoy their leisure time.

The scheme will be funded by South Norfolk Council, Norfolk County Council and the Town Council. Our Council Leader, Cllr John Fuller said: "South Norfolk has received its share of the extra business rates paid by expanding businesses across the whole of Norfolk. In the past we have invested in Diss's heritage triangle and in Wymondham and Long Stratton with town centre improvements and sporting facilities.

"Now it's Harleston's turn, and we are proposing to invest all that extra business rates income together with some of the extra council tax paid by the occupiers of new homes - the best part of three quarters of a million pounds - in helping Harleston move with the times and be best placed to respond to the changes the pandemic has accelerated."

The project stems from the need, identified during the COVID-19 pandemic, to create a reduction in through-traffic in the town centre. A multi stakeholder project board has produced a plan for a more permanent series of improvements.

Suggested changes to the Market Place, Exchange Street, the Thoroughfare and Broad Street will see some relocation of parking places, giving more direct access to the busy retail areas. Reduced carriageways will slow traffic and make the town centre safer for pedestrians, while wider pavements and the introduction of planters and benches will all add to the improved streetscape and make the town centre a better place to live, work and spend time.



Helping you stay warm this winter

The health and wellbeing of our residents is one of our top priorities.

If your property has no central heating or is poorly insulated, cold or expensive to heat and you are claiming benefits or your household's annual income is under £30,000, then we may be able to help you.

Whether you own your home or rent privately, you could be eligible for a fully-funded grant to reduce heating costs and improve the energy efficiency of your home. If you privately rent, landlords will be required to contribute at least one third of the cost for rental properties up to a grant maximum of £5,000.

If your property is not connected to the mains gas network then you could benefit from the installation of an air source heat pump and if your property



is not suitable, then we can also offer high heat retention storage heaters. Insulation measures including loft and cavity walls are also offered to properties with an EPC rating of E or below.

Our team also provides essential assistance and advice to residents who are struggling to heat their homes.

The speedway track which was built in 1966 has been maintained and improved on minimal funds by a small group of volunteers. Now, a major £45,000 project is underway to bring this popular facility up to world-class standards.

Fundraising Officer Russ Marling said: "The grant will be used to pay for improvements around the pit areas, including a new concrete area to service bikes. It will also be spent on a new entrance to the speedway and new paths, which will all be an awesome addition to the track."

The club has over 70 active members, most of whom are children.

Russ said: "Anyone can come along and have a go, we have a wide range of bikes in all sizes and just ask that people wear long sleeves and trousers and bring their own helmet and gloves."

Local hero honoured

In September, Councillor Vic Thomson paid tribute to local resident Keith Saxton, for his outstanding contribution to the village of Rockland St Mary, when he unveiled a plaque at the Parish Reading Room.

When Yorkshireman Keith moved to the village in 1999, the historic Parish Room was neglected and bordering on derelict. However, Keith could see its potential beneath the cobwebs and mildew and with the support of a small committee set about restoring it.

Over a period of twenty years, Keith and his team undertook a wide range of fundraising activities, including jumble sales and quizzes. Keith also sought public grants and subsidies, including various grants from our community funding schemes.

After a long-sustained campaign, the Parish Room was transformed into a charming, comfortable venue that is widely used by the village.

It now serves as a venue for meetings, including Parish Council meetings, leisure activities such as table tennis and Pilates as well as private functions. It's also used as a Polling Station during local and national elections.



Now in his 80s, Keith has stepped away from the day to day running of the Parish Room, but the plaque which has been mounted on the wall will remind people of his exceptional contribution to the village.

Over a period of twenty years, through a combination of charm, persistence and an indomitable Yorkshire spirit, Keith managed to transform the Parish Room beyond all recognition.

While unemployment is relatively low in South Norfolk, we continue to do all we can to help people into work, or volunteering.

Whether this is through our Choices programme, aimed at getting people back into work, or through our apprenticeship scheme, which has seen us hire 13 apprentices of various ages in the past few months.

We also fully support the Government's Kickstart Scheme which helps young people aged 16-24 to get a foot on the career ladder. Not only have we hired 11 Kickstarters ourselves, but we have taken it a step further by supporting 20 businesses to create 73 opportunities for young people too.

Kickstarters are fully funded by the Government, and as a Council, we have acted as a gateway provider to support businesses to offer work placements, to give our young people greater opportunities.

Our Cabinet Member Councillor Lisa Neal said:

"We have worked with local businesses to ensure there are a wide variety of opportunities available to young people looking to get into work and start a career."

Choices is our free programme helping residents gain the skills and confidence to find employment.

It's already helped many people in Broadland and now, for the first time, we are able to offer it to South Norfolk residents.

The programme runs over 6 weeks (one 3 hour session per week) and offers practical help to support people back into work, such as how to write or improve your CV, interview techniques, where to look for jobs, training courses and volunteering opportunities and much more.

For resident Tracey, Choices gave her the skills and confidence to get back into work. Tracey said:

"I had been a self-employed florist for several years, working from home, when I decided to change my profession. However, I lacked the confidence and tools to equip me in applying for a job.

"I was very apprehensive on my first day but was greeted by Jane who immediately made me feel at ease. There were four other ladies starting the course, all wanting to achieve the same outcome. Jane introduced Heather, who would be tutoring us, she was very welcoming. I started to relax and feel comfortable amongst the group. I looked forward to every Tuesday morning from there on.

"Since starting Choices, I have gone on to work for Saffron Housing, East Anglian Air Ambulance and currently work for Broadland District and South Norfolk Council. I gained skills and confidence but also new friends who I am still in contact with."

Our next available programme begins early in 2022 at Wymondham Leisure Centre. Attendance is flexible - just come to as many sessions as you are able to.

Flooding: be prepared

Last year we saw unprecedented flooding across the district, with homes and businesses badly damaged by flood water.

We hope we will not experience such flooding again, but if we do, there are several things you can do to prepare and minimise the impact.

- Register for flood alerts. Find out if you are at risk of flooding by visiting www.gov.uk/check-flood-risk and register to receive live flood alerts, or call the Environment Agency's Floodline on 0345 988 1188.
- Prepare your home. Consider whether to buy flood protection equipment such as air brick covers and flood boards, visit www.gov. uk/prepare-for-flooding/future-flooding.
- Know how to turn off gas, electricity and water supplies in your property.
- Put together an emergency kit and prepare a household emergency plan. Think about how you will receive flood warnings, where you'll put flood defences, where you will evacuate to if you have to leave your home and how to protect your possessions such as furniture etc. You should also keep your insurance documents in your emergency kit and photos of your valuables.
- Listen to your local radio for up-to-date information and weather updates and get to know the flood warning codes and what they mean.
- Check your insurance. Make sure you are adequately covered for flood risks, have 'new' for 'old' cover and have correctly valued your contents. If you have a vehicle check it is also covered for flood damage.

The £4,000 prize fund was split between South Norfolk's five Neighbourhoods to ensure that it was shared across the district and the names of all of the community




groups and schools that registered to take part in a litter pick were entered into a draw.
