

Our Chairman Cllr Roger Foulger hosted a 'Celebrating Broadland' civic reception in

September to thank the business community.

Cllr Foulger welcomed guests to the Chairman's reception from across Broadland, including many business owners who we supported during the pandemic.

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Cllr Roger Foulger said: "It's the first civic event that we have been able to have for a long time and my first as Chairman. We wanted to say thank you to the businesses we have supported and worked with during the pandemic, and recognise the efforts made by members of staff at Broadland, who delivered food parcels and collected prescriptions for residents.

"We also wanted to say a huge thank you to our parish and town councils, as they were a lifeline to local communities throughout the crisis.

"It's been tremendous to see our businesses, staff, communities and parish and town councils pull together and support eachother and this event was a great opportuinty for the Council to show its appreciation."

An auction of promises was held during the event to benefit charities with offers including the chance to patrol the Broads with a member of the Broads Beat team, as well as experiences and gifts donated by local businesses such as Woodforde's Brewery, Fairhaven Woodland & Water Garden, Roarr!, The Lively Crew, The Dial House, and Royal Norwich Golf Club.

Proceeds raised were shared between The Big C, which was Cllr Karen Vincent's chosen charity during her time as Chairman, and East Anglian Air Ambulance, the Chairman's chosen charity.



A recipe for innovation and success

On 12 October a ceremony was held to mark the beginning of construction of the new Broadland Food Innovation Centre.

The Broadland Food Innovation Centre is being built specifically to support growing food businesses and help transform their great potential into thriving commerce.

The 13 units of varying sizes are designed to meet food grade specification standards and range from 153 m2 to 461m2, all within a secured site.

Each unit faces the communal Green Street along the centre and has direct individual access from the outer side. High ceilings allow for gravity-based processes and a systems support helps maximise energy efficiency.

For testing and selling, there are separate tasting rooms, test

kitchens and presentation areas.

Our Council Leader, Shaun Vincent said: "This is really exciting project for our district and the whole region. The Broadland Food Innovation Centre will support our local food and drink businesses and make it easier for existing businesses to expand, boosting the rural economy.

"The Centre will give us the opportunity to help nurture new ideas and enable us to focus on processing Norfolk's agricultural output locally, minimising food miles and improving the environmental impact."

This innovative project offers a unique opportunity for the food and drink sector to capitalise on the region's expert local knowledge and food supply base. It is perfectly situated, just off the A47, to link Norwich Research Park's work relating to food and health with food and drink businesses, manufacturers and distributors.

The project will contribute to the regional economy by creating the ideal conditions for innovation, creativity and productivity, leading to increased wealth and high-quality employment opportunities.

Celebrating outstanding design

Winners of our annual Design and Enhancement Awards were announced at a recent ceremony held at The Space, Norwich. Also announced was a special recognition award for accessible design.

The awards highlight improvements to buildings and constructions that make a beneficial contribution to and enrich the local environment.

Cllr Karen Vincent, Chair of the Awards Panel said: "These awards celebrate the type of buildings that make a positive contribution to the local area and raise the design standard in Broadland, whether it's an impressive new dwelling or an existing property that has been beautifully enhanced. We are pleased to celebrate the hard work and ingenuity that goes into creating award-worthy structures."

The Duckeries won the Design Award, designed by SA Architectural Services. The judging panel considered the house to be a cutting edge example of a self-build project, particularly liking the sustainable features and how well the contemporary design fitted into its surroundings and garden.

The Walled Garden in Little Plumstead won the Enhancement Award. The community spirit and participation of this project impressed the judges. The repair and restoration of the historic garden wall and the introduction of a café and shop with



different areas of gardening, were considered to be well thought through.

The Nest in Horsford won a Special Recognition Award for Accessible design, designed by Chaplin Farrant architects. The design of the community facility is specifically built around its users' needs to include a clubhouse, residential 'bunk boxes', a floodlit 3G pitch, multiuse community spaces, classrooms and a café. Judges were impressed with how the building had been designed for community use, and a lot of care and attention was given to ensure the facilities are accessible to all.



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Since the first draw in February 2021, our Community at Heart Lottery is well on course to raise our target of £45,000 for good causes in the district in its first year.

So far 59 good causes have joined the lottery for free, including Cup-O-T: Wellness and Therapy Services. Catherine Gray, CEO and Founder, said: "Being part of the lottery means we are able to continue delivering our Occupational Therapy and EMDR trauma therapy services to young people in rural parts of our county. Keeping the therapy van on the road has been challenging over the last year, and funds from the lottery enables us to do this."

Several schools and nurseries are fundraising through the lottery.

"With so many children learning through play every week, our resources need constant replacement, so fundraising is a vital part of ensuring we have lots of good quality toys and resources for the children to play with," said Lacey Douglass, Administration Manager of The Heathers Nursery.

Without the lottery funds, the nursery would have had to spend the next few years raising money to cover the costs of a recently purchased sandpit, reading chair and benches.

Debbie MacMillan, PTFA (Parent, Teachers and Friends Association) Secretary for Taverham Junior School, said: "The lottery funds have helped with our big outdoor projects, such as hedgehog houses in our wildlife garden. The garden projects have helped create more outdoor learning environments for the children, and teach them about the importance of looking after our environment and wildlife."

Wroxham & Hoveton Lions Club uses funds raised by the lottery to support the community. Trustee Mike Clipston said: "The proceeds go into our general charity fund, from which we have recently assisted a lady referred to us by domestic abuse charity Leeway, the local St John Ambulance, and Afghan refugees evacuated to this country."



Our Deputy Leader Cllr Trudy Mancini-Boyle, said: "I'm delighted that the Community at Heart Lottery has generated such a significant sum of money for good causes in Broadland, particularly as many of these groups encountered fundraising challenges due to COVID-19 restrictions. It's great to see our lottery directly benefitting Broadland residents."

Every day Councillors make decisions that impact on the lives of Broadland's residents. These decisions are about how public money, Council Tax and Business Rates are both collected and spent and how our public services are delivered.

Councillors promote community cohesion, environmental

protection as well as equality and diversity in their decision making and the process includes:

- Full council
- Cabinet
- Regulatory committees such as planning and licensing

To ensure the process is open and transparent and that the decisions taken are fair, inclusive and represent the best interests of all residents, the Council has an overview and scrutiny committee. Our Scrutiny Committee can review existing policy and recommend changes. The committee can also look into areas of concern raised by residents and we welcome your involvement.

Residents can also get involved by taking part in our annual budget consultation, letting us know the services you consider priorities for spending. We also ask about levels of Council Tax and about the possibility of paying for services that the Council does not have to offer by law.

New equipment is a life-saver

Each of our District Councillors has an annual grant of £500 to spend on projects in their ward to improve the quality of life of our residents by supporting commuity groups.

In Thorpe St Andrew South East, councillors Sue Lawn, Trudy Mancini-Boyle and Jonathan Emsell, used their grants to install a defibrillator at Roxley Hall.

The building on Yarmouth Road is used by many different groups and is home to the local Dementia Support Group. Having a defibrillator on site will benefit the local community and everyone that uses the building for community activities and may save lives.

Previously the councillors have used their grants to support the local Bystanders Cricket Club, Thorpe St Andrew under 12 girls' football team and to purchase mini lending libraries. They also helped purchase the Dog Agility equipment, sited in the park area of Queen Elizabeth Woods off Pound Lane. The councillors were aware that many residents own dogs, so worked with the Town Council to install the equipment and offer residents something a little different.

Cllr Fran Whymark and Cllr Martin Murrell, ward members for Wroxham, recently granted £200 to Wroxham Football Club.

The money was spent on new winter tops for the U15s football team, so they are protected from the elements. The players can now train and play football matches throughout the season.

Cllr Fran Whymark said: "It was a real pleasure to support the Wroxham Football Club U15s and buy them new winter tops with my members grant. If it helps the young people get out and enjoy activity with their friends it's money well spent."



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Earlier in the year, Cllr Justine Thomas officially opened Marty's Marsh, an outdoor community space, on behalf of Blofield Parish Council.

The Council helped Blofield Parish Council purchase the land in 2019, between Langham Green and Cremer's Meadow off the Brundall/Blofield Road, to preserve it for community use and protect it from development. Cllr Justine Thomas donated some of her member grant to purchase a bench for the area, so people could sit and enjoy the views.

Helping you stay warm this winter



The health and wellbeing of our residents is one of our top priorities.

If your property has no central heating or is poorly insulated, cold or expensive to heat and you are claiming benefits or your household's annual income is under £30,000, then we may be able to help you.

Whether you own your home or privately rent, you could be eligible for a fully funded grant to reduce heating costs and improve the energy efficiency of your home. If you privately rent, landlords will be required to contribute at least one third of the cost for rental properties up to a grant maximum of £5,000.

If your property is not connected to the mains gas network then you could benefit from the installation of an air source heat pump and if your property is not suitable, then we can also offer high heat retention storage heaters. Insulation measures including loft and cavity wall are also offered to properties with an Energy Perfomance Certificate rating of E or below.

Our team also provides essential assistance and advice to residents who are struggling to heat their homes.

Funding boost for community groups

We are helping local groups kick-start community projects with a new Get it Started Grant.

Funding of up to £300 is available to individuals or groups that are keen to bring communities together to form not-for-profit organisations.

Cllr Trudy Mancini-Boyle said: "Small community initiatives are really important to the wellbeing of local residents. So whether you have an idea for a support group, a fitness club or a group that works together to improve the local area, we want to help you to hit the ground running."

Funding can be used for anything that is needed to get an idea off the ground, including equipment purchase or hire, venue hire, promotional materials or transport.

The Get It Started grant is funded by our Community at Heart Lottery.

Cllr Mancini-Boyle said: "All the money raised from our lottery goes back into the community, supporting good causes, or funding smaller community initiatives through grants like this. So, when you buy a ticket, not only could you be in with a chance of winning our top prize of £25,000, but you are also helping to keep Broadland the wonderful place it is." Applicants to the Get it Started Grant must be Broadland residents or voluntary groups that work within the Broadland area. The grant is open to all age groups.

Helping people into work

While unemployment is relatively low in Broadland, we continue to do all we can to help people into work, or volunteering.

Whether this is through our Choices programme, aimed at getting people back into work, or through our apprenticeship scheme, which has seen us hire 13 apprentices of various ages in the past few months.

We also fully support the Government's Kickstart Scheme which helps young people aged 16-24 to get a foot on the career ladder. Not only have we hired 11 Kickstarters ourselves, but we have taken it a step further by supporting 20 businesses to create 73 opportunities for young people too. Kickstarters are fully funded by the Government, and as a Council, we have acted as a gateway provider to support businesses to offer work placements, to give our young people greater opportunities.

Our portfolio holder for Economic Development, Cllr Joe Copplestone, said:

"We have worked with local businesses to ensure there are a wide variety of opportunities available to young people looking to get into work and start a career."

Unemployed? You do have choices

Choices is our free programme helping residents gain the skills and confidence to find employment.

Our successful Choices programme is aimed at getting people back into work.

The programme runs over 6 weeks (one 3 hour session per week) and offers practical help to support people back into work, such as how to write or improve your CV, interview techniques, where to look for jobs, training courses and volunteering opportunities and much more.

For resident Tracey, Choices gave her the skills and confidence to get back into work. Tracey said:

"I had been a self-employed florist for several years, working from home, when I decided to change my profession. However, I lacked the confidence and tools to equip me in applying for a job.

"I was very apprehensive on my first day but was greeted by Jane who immediately made me feel at ease. There were four other ladies starting the course, all wanting to achieve the same outcome. Jane introduced Heather, who would be tutoring us, she was very welcoming. I started to relax and feel comfortable amongst the group. I looked forward to every Tuesday morning from there on.

"Since starting Choices, I have gone on to work for Saffron Housing, East Anglian Air Ambulance and currently work for Broadland and South Norfolk Council. I gained skills and confidence but also new friends who I'm still in contact with."

Our next available programme begins early in 2022 at Carrowbreck House, Hellesdon, NR6 5FA. Attendance is flexible just come to as many sessions as you are able to.

Additional service coming your way

We are making our waste collection service more environmentally friendly and expanding our food waste service.

We have just signed a new contract with Veolia for all waste collection services including residual, recycling, food waste and for street cleaning.

All the vehicles will run on Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil fuel instead of diesel which will help reduce the amount of carbon dioxide produced from 1,110 tonnes to 22 tonnes.

Cllr Judy Leggett, portfolio holder for Environmental Excellence said: "This is a huge contribution to our Environment Strategy and will contribute to our aim of being carbon neutral well before the government's target date."


The new contract also includes the expansion of our food waste collection service, which will be rolled out to all residents by 2023.

Residents will also receieve weekly kerbside collections of small electrical and electronic equipment (WEEE) and textile collections. Cllr Leggett said: "We are delighted to continue working with Veolia to make our waste and recycling services more effective and even more environmentally friendly."

The evaluation of the tender bids was weighted to reflect the high importance the authority places on maintaining and improving the current quality of services being provided to residents, rather than cost.

Cllr Leggett added: "While quality was the driving force behind our decision, the new contract delivers tremendous value for money for our residents and delivers on our priority to protect and enhance our local environment."

The 10 year contract starts in April 2022 with an option for an extension of up to a further 10 years.

We are continuing our strong track record of green initiatives and are exploring ways in which we can help our community to invest in greening our District.

This is going to be in the form of a green bond, which will give a small return on people's financial investment and will allow us to invest in environmental improvements to our community.

At present, we are considering the type of improvements we can offer, whether it's providing affordable loans for people to reduce the carbon footprint of their homes or businesses, or improving community electric vehicle charging facilities, enhancing the new Broadland Country Park, or delivering a new solar farm.

Flooding: be prepared

Last year we saw unprecedented flooding across the district, with homes and businesses badly damaged by flood water.

We hope we will not experience such flooding again, but if we do, there are several things you can do to prepare and minimise the impact.

- **Register for flood alerts.** Find out if you are at risk of flooding by visiting **www.gov.uk/check-flood-risk** and register to receive live flood alerts, or call the Environment Agency's Floodline on **0345 988 1188**.
- Prepare your home. Consider whether to buy flood protection equipment such as air brick covers and flood boards, visit www.gov. uk/prepare-for-flooding/future-flooding.
- Know how to turn off gas, electricity and water supplies in your property.
- Put together an emergency kit and prepare a household emergency plan. Think about how you will receive flood warnings, where you'll put flood defences, where you will evacuate to if you have to leave your home and how to protect your possessions such as furniture etc. You should also keep your insurance documents in your emergency kit and photos of your valuables.
- Listen to your **local radio for up-to-date information** and weather updates and get to know the flood warning codes and what they mean.
- Check your insurance. Make sure you are adequately covered for flood risks, have 'new' for 'old' cover and have correctly valued your contents. If you have a vehicle check it is also covered for flood damage.

We are working on the A11 to provide a safer and better road surface, improving safety and driving conditions for motorists.




