We are still the Norfolk council with the highest recycling rates. We have successfully now gone further by enabling all our residents to have food waste collections and introducing small electrical, battery and textile kerbside collections. Our refuse vehicles now run on bio-fuel. We will soon be moving into our new home, the Horizon Centre, a building that is much more environmentally friendly and will significantly reduce our running costs. I am also extremely proud of the support and assistance the Council and our residents gave

to those seeking safety from the conflict in Ukraine.

The Council has continued to support our local businesses offering grants to help their bright ideas become reality. We have enabled many fledgling businesses to take off and have offered advice and support to existing businesses as they grow.

We have supported the local and regional economy. By attracting investment into our district we have been able to open the Broadland Food Innovation Centre, thus increasing the amount of food grown locally being processed in Norfolk. This ability reduces food miles, helps the environment and strengthens the local economy.

Moving with the times

Following the successful purchase of the Horizon Centre, we are on the move to Broadland Business Park.

From next year the Horizon Centre will be the new home for Broadland District Council.

Council Leader, Cllr Shaun Vincent, said: "This is a really positive move for the Council and our staff. We have committed to being Net Zero by 2030 and our new building will help us to reduce our building carbon footprint by an incredible 84%.

"The move will also help us save taxpayers millions of pounds over the coming years with huge savings in running costs for the Council. Those savings will enable us to continue to provide quality services that make a real difference to our residents' lives and at a time when all other bills are rising, helping us to not have to increase Council Tax."

The Council's offices at Thorpe need extensive refurbishment and have higher maintenance costs. The much lower running costs of the Horizon Centre will slash these expenses by £300,000 every year and 2,500 solar panels will also help offset future energy price hikes.

The staggering 84% reduction in the carbon footprint of our office building will strengthen our position as a very low-emission council.

Cllr Vincent added: "Broadland District Council continues to lead the way on protecting the environment. Our new building is much more ecofriendly than Thorpe Lodge and the Horizon Centre's electric charging points will also make it easier for staff and visitors to use electric vehicles."

Our new home is only two miles from Thorpe Lodge, easily accessible by public transport and has plenty of parking.

Game changer for the region

The Broadland Food Innovation Centre has officially opened its doors for first time.

Cllr Trudy Mancini-Boyle, Deputy Leader of Broadland District Council, welcomed guests to mark the beginning of an exciting new era of economic opportunity for the region's food sector. The Broadland Food Innovation Centre is instrumental to a major project designed to support and fasttrack the growth and success of food and drink businesses across Norfolk and Suffolk, encouraging investment into the district. The purpose built centre offers food-grade incubation units, test kitchens, a sensory kitchen, meeting rooms and fully equipped, state-of-the-art conferencing facilities.

Cllr Trudy Mancini-Boyle said "The completion of the Broadland Food Innovation Centre in such a short time is a tremendous achievement and highlights the outstanding work done by Broadland District Council to support local businesses and our local economy.

"The facilities available will enable food processing to happen in our district rather than outside of the region. This is good for local business and it enables a dramatic cut in food miles which is also good for the environment."



This important Council initiative based on the Food Enterprise Park near Honingham is backed and funded by a partnership which includes Broadland District Council, Hethel Innovation, University of East Anglia, New Anglia Local Enterprise Partnership, European Regional Development Fund and HM Government.



Ours is a Council of action and we do what we say. We will achieve Net Zero by 2030. The time for talking has passed, this is a time for action and doing something about it!"




What we've done

Broadland District Council has already made huge strides in reducing its carbon footprint. The refuse fleet has changed from using diesel to Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil resulting in a massive reduction in carbon emissions. Food waste collections have been rolled out across the district and kerbside electrical battery and textile collections have all been introduced. "The Council has made reaching Net Zero by 2030 one of our main priorities and we have already taken significant steps towards making this happen."

What we're doing

The Council is moving to the Horizon Centre as its home. The new building is much more environmentally friendly than the old offices at Thorpe Lodge and will significantly reduce our carbon footprint. The Council is exploring further initiatives and solutions to help us bridge the gap between our planned impacts and our Net Zero destination, including the refurbishment of our Frettenham Depot.



Broadland District Councillor, Judy Leggett, portfolio holder for Environmental Excellence said: "The actions we have already taken have reduced the Council's carbon footprint by 70% and our agreed plans for next year will reduce that to 80%.

However, there will be some emissions that will be more difficult to remove. We will develop projects both for the Council and for our communities to offset these remaining emissions, such as grants for better insulation of housing, grants for air source heat pumps and grants to plant trees. We will do what it takes to achieve Net Zero by 2030."

Business Builder boosting local economy

Broadland District Council's Business Builder Programme helps fledgling and existing businesses develop and move forward.

For 24-year-old Matt Carey the 'daily grind' took on a whole new meaning in January, when he swapped his 9-5 for a new mobile coffee business, the Green Wave Coffee Company.

He successfully applied to the Council for a £1,000 grant to help pay for some of the start-up costs, including equipment and signage.

Matt whose first job had been working at Costa Coffee when he was 16, said: "I'd wanted to own my own business for a while and coffee seemed the obvious choice. The support I received from Broadland District Council really helped kick-start the dream."

Matt's business has an emphasis on green sustainability and also supports other local companies, he said: "Our coffee is from Symposium Coffee Roasters in Hellesdon, we use Norton's Dairy in Frettenham for our milk and our cakes come from Dollies Bakery in Wroxham and other local suppliers."

Young mum Phoebe Beaumont also recently benefitted from a £1,000 grant and business support to help launch her new graphic design business. Phoebe had a graphic design degree and was keen to do something that would fit in around her 2-year-old daughter. So in May she decided to start her own business, Put a Pin In It.

The business offers a range of unique cards, illustrations, notepads and prints all designed by Phoebe.

She said: "I decided to go selfemployed but the equipment and software I was using was unreliable and ten years out of date."

"I had heard about the grant through a friend and contacted Jane Bagley, one of the Council's Economic Development Officers, who came round and helped me draw up a business plan and apply for the grant, as well as offering other business support."

Phoebe used the grant to buy a new computer and software. She said: "It has made a huge difference. In this area of work, it's really important to have the latest software and I can now do all my artwork and accounts without having to worry about the computer crashing."



The computer links to her new printer, which means she no longer has to pay for external printing.

"It's saved me a huge amount of money. The equipment along with the advice I have received from Jane has been massive help with building my business."

The Council recently launched a brand-new initiative to support people suffering with mental health issues. The Mindful Towns and Villages scheme launched in Aylsham and will be rolled out across the rest of the district over the coming months.

The scheme provides free training and support to local community groups, schools and businesses to create hundreds of certified Mental Health Champions throughout the district.

Broadland District Council's Cabinet Member for Wellbeing, Cllr Fran Whymark, said: "Since the outbreak of the Covid 19 pandemic the NHS has experienced record demand for mental health services. This project raises awareness of mental health issues and challenges the associated stigma. It will also help to ensure that immediate support is available in the community and in the workplace.

"With one in four adults and one in ten children experiencing mental illness, there has never been a greater need for such a service. By creating these Mental Health Champions we are throwing a lifeline to those suffering from mental illness and also to their families and friends who may need support too." The Council's Help Hub will be on-hand to support all of the newly created Mental Health Champions. A dedicated Mental Health Support Worker is available to talk through people's concerns, provide advice on next steps and the different services.

Cllr Whymark added:

"We know we have an amazing community spirit in Broadland. We saw communities pulling together throughout the pandemic, going out of the way to help and support each other through difficult times. Many of the groups that were created during that period are still going, still supporting our district's most vulnerable residents. We would like to encourage them to take on this training and to continue their amazing work.

"It's been reported that 1 in 6 workers will experience depression, anxiety or problems relating to stress at any one time. If you are an employer this training could really benefit you, your staff and your customers. "We know we have an amazing community spirit in Broadland."

Broadland District Council was the first local authority in Norfolk to carry out separate food waste collection and now the Council has rolled out its food waste collections across the whole district, adding an additional 30,000 households to the service.

Cllr Judy Leggett, Portfolio Holder for Environmental Excellence, said: "We are pleased and proud to make this investment in our district. As well as reducing harm to the planet and protecting the



environment, this forward-looking step will bring real benefits to our residents. The food waste we collect will be used to generate electricity and as fertiliser for use in farming."

Broadland has the highest recycling rate of any local authority in the County! And with our new food waste recycling drive, we'll be doing even more for our environment.

Join the recycling revolution!

Last year the Council recycled more than 2,600 tonnes of waste food! But we want to aim bigger. Help us by recycling all your waste food and together we could remove the yearly CO2 equivalent of 54 cars. Don't put your tea bags in the normal bin, put them in your food waste!

Did you know?

Alongside the roll out of waste food collections the Council has increased recycling options for residents with the introduction of kerbside collections for small electrical items, batteries, and textiles. These new services offer an exciting opportunity for residents to play their part in the recycling revolution and help the Council to protect the environment by recycling as much as possible.

A converted grain store in Reepham, the Blue Sky Barn has won Broadland District Council's Enhancement Award.

Owner Luke Hawes was delighted to receive this prestigious award.

Cllr Karen Vincent, Chair of the Awards Panel, said: "What Luke has achieved by converting this old agricultural building into a beautiful four bedroom home is tremendous. It is a great example of modern style and elegance. The building is sympathetic to its rural surroundings and retains the wonderful agricultural character."

The Awards Panel were also impressed with the energy efficiency of the building with use of a ground source heat pump to generate energy and the triple-glazed windows to provide insulation. The conversion has created a modern sustainable home whilst retaining the original structure, blending in fantastically to its street scene and rural surroundings, including the adjacent medieval church.

The simple vertical pattern of metal and timber louvres wraps the building, revealing double-height glass, permitting uninterrupted views of the church, the meadows and the large blue Norfolk skies beyond as well as from skylights within the building.

Another grand design that attracted the Panel's attention was a prominent building on Aylsham's Market Place that has recently undergone a complete renovation.

The Ironmongers, formally known as Clarkes, was Highly Commended by the judges.

Farmer Tim Briscoe has now reopened the building, housing the popular artisan bakery Bread Source, a new tapas and cocktail bar, and is soon to open a pizza and wine bar. Upstairs has also been transformed into a boutique hotel with eight individual bedrooms all with ensuites.

Cllr Vincent told us: "This building was in a very poor condition and the transformation is phenomenal. It has been beautifully and sympathetically restored and has retained its wonderful charm, we were particularly impressed with the creative use of original materials from within the building. Tim and his team have worked hard to restore this building and this renovation will ensure it continues to be an important and vibrant part of the town for many years to come."



Broadland celebrates local food businesses

Broadland District Council was delighted to sponsor the VIP Reception at the 2022 Local Flavours. This is the biggest food trade event in East Anglia connecting over 100 producers with buyers.

Keep warm this winter

The health and wellbeing of our residents is a priority for the Council and we are helping our most vulnerable residents to heat their homes more efficiently, keeping them safe and warm while saving them money.

Portfolio Holder, Cllr Fran Whymark said: "The Norfolk Warm Homes Partnership, led by Broadland District Council, is providing financial assistance to our residents to help keep homes warm across Norfolk this winter.

"We are actively looking to help people living in houses with poor, inefficient electrical heating, such as old storage heaters and plugin radiators, that could benefit from a new more efficient central heating system."

One of our residents, David, lives in a three bedroom detached bungalow which had a very old and inefficient oil back boiler. Having been advised by his heating engineer that "it was hard to get parts for and that the boiler may not last through the next winter", he started to look at his options.

David explained: "My son told me about the Norfolk Warm Homes project that he had seen online, to help install insulation and renewable heating, so I looked into it and to my surprise I was eligible for funding as I have an income of less than £30,000".

THE WARM HOMES

"I applied and just weeks later I had an oil leak from the old back boiler which meant it was going to have to be replaced, costing me thousands of pounds so when the Warm Homes Team said they could fully fund an air source heat pump I jumped at the opportunity".

As part of the application process the Norfolk Warm Homes Team arranged for their vetted contractors to assess David's property: "I didn't have a clue what energy rating my property would be as I have been here since the 1970's so when the assessor came around I was glad to hear it was well insulated with cavity wall and loft insulation. Having also upgraded my



windows to double glazing some time ago, the heating engineer that visited said my property would be very suitable for an air source heat pump".

Once the survey was complete and the quotation was sent for the Warm Homes for review, David received an approval, awarding a grant to cover the complete cost of works.

David has now had his air source heat pump since November and says that "I no longer have to worry about remembering to save up and order heating oil as the air source heat pump uses electricity so it is just the one monthly bill now, and I have a lovely new heating system to keep me warm. I even turned down the thermostat after a few weeks as it was so warm".

Now that the air source heat pump has been installed, the energy performance certificate rating (EPC) has increased to C. Because air source heat pumps are a sustainable heating type, David's property now saves 3.4 tonnes of carbon per year.

Taking action to support our communities

We understand that many people may be struggling to cope with the rising cost of living. If you are concerned – please take a look at some of the support we have available.

Council Tax Assistance

People on low incomes may be eligible for Council Tax Assistance. Other Council Tax bill reductions include the Single Person Discount and the Discretionary Council Tax relief scheme which is available to anyone who is struggling and you don't have to be in receipt of benefits.

Housing costs

If you are of working age and on a low income you may be able to receive help with the cost of rent by applying for Universal Credit or Housing Benefit for certain properties. If you already receive Universal Credit, help with rent should already be included. People of pension-age or on a low income may be entitled to Housing Benefit. Housing Benefit is available to social and private renters.

If you receive Universal Credit or Housing Benefit and this does not cover your full rent, you can apply to us for a Discretionary Housing Payment.

Mortgage interest payments or loans

If you're a homeowner on qualifying benefits, you might be able to get help towards interest payments on your mortgage or loans you've taken out for certain repairs and improvements to your home. Get in touch with our Help Hub team to find out more.





Benefits, debt and budgeting support

If you're of working age and on a low income you may be eligible for Universal Credit and other help. Our Benefits Team can help you access the money available to you. Similarly, our Help Hub can offer debt and budgeting support to those who need it.

Energy debts grants

If you're in debt to your energy supplier you might be able to get a grant to help pay it off.

Citizens Advice has created a list of grants offered by energy providers to their customers. Even if your provider isn't listed you may be eligible for a grant from the British Gas Energy Trust. These grants are available to anyone – not just British Gas customers.

Winter fuel payment

If you were born on or before 25 September 1956, you could get between £250 and £600 to help pay your heating bills. The amount you'll get includes your 'pensioner cost of living payment'. This is between £150 and £300. You'll only get this extra amount from winter 2022 to 2023. This is in addition to any cost-ofliving payment you get with your benefit or tax credits.

Warm spaces

We're working with Norfolk Community Foundation and local communities to create a network of warm spaces where residents can come together to stay warm and enjoy a cup of tea and access advice if needed.

Warm space locations can be found through our Help Hub team or via our website.

Foodbanks

If you are on a low income and have an unexpected crisis or an emergency that means you cannot afford food, we may be able to help by referring you to a foodbank, just get in touch via our Help Hub.

Free school meals

If you are in receipt of certain benefits your child may be entitled to free school meals.

School children who are eligible are entitled to a daily two-course meal which could be worth up to £400 a year.

Free School Meals can be applied for through Norfolk County Council.
