As it celebrates 25 years of supporting local bereaved children, Nelson's Journey is looking forward to a bright future, filled with hope and healing for all those who need it.


After spending a year being admired and enjoyed by residents and visitors to the district four of the seven beautiful corgis, created by local community arts organisation Tin House, went under the hammer

Broadland Food Innovation Centre shortlisted for national award

We are delighted that Broadland's Food Innovation Centre has been shortlisted for a national economic development award.

The new centre, that was opened earlier this year, is already home to businesses looking to make best use of the cutting-edge facilities.

Leader Shaun Vincent said: "This is excellent news, underlining how important it is for the Council to invest in infrastructure which fosters business growth and strengthens our local economy. I am delighted that ambitious food and drink companies are choosing the Broadland Food Innovation Centre (BFIC) with its exciting combination of bespoke state of the art facilities and superb support services.

"The facilities available here will enable food processing to happen in our district rather than outside of the region. This is not only good for local business, it also enables us to dramatically cut food miles which is good for the environment."

PrepKing UK prepare nutritionally balanced, tasty, gourmet meals and every Sunday they deliver a week's supply of meals straight to people's homes. This rapidly growing business started in 2021 with one van delivering to Norfolk residents.



After the move to the Broadland Food Innovation Centre, the team launched their nationwide service in autumn 2022. Owner Steve Holland said: "The plan was always to go national and the BFIC is perfect for us at this stage of our growth. If it wasn't for the BFIC, we probably would have moved out of the region, but now we've been able to stay in Norfolk and grow, so it's the best of both for us. Exactly what we needed."

Masterchef finalist Annabel Anderson is behind awardwinning Old Rectory Preserves producing artisan preserves, jellies and marmalades. She said: "The decision to move into the Centre was straightforward having made the decision to grow our business. These facilities are ideal for gaining the highest food standard accreditation and the advice offered by the support team has been invaluable in

helping the business to achieve its goals. The plan now is to increase production and improve distribution, so hopefully more people will be able to enjoy our wonderful jams made only from British sugar and local heritage fruit."

The BFIC also offers conference room and test kitchens for hire, which made it possible for Adam Oxbury, owner of Ketteringham Foods Ltd, to fulfil a contract to produce and deliver 2,500 hot meals during the Christmas holiday period for local schoolchildren who qualify for free meals provision. "Using the BFIC test kitchen enabled me to test cook and fulfil a large contract which has now trebled in size and covers the whole of Norfolk. It's a great space, fully kitted out with the high grade commercial equipment, it made a swift turnaround pain-free with great results for the customer and my company".

















Unblocking our development potential

Broadland District Council is leading the way in getting builders back to work.

Since March 2022, Broadland District Council has not been able to grant planning permission for any new house or overnight accommodation in the catchment of the River Wensum or the Broads. This is due to the high level of nutrients that are present in both these Special Areas of Conservation.

Natural England has told the Council that building cannot start again until builders and water authorities have come up with new ways to address the issue and achieve 'nutrient neutrality'.
This stance has stopped
development across the country,
so to break the deadlock the
Council is establishing a Joint
Venture Company to work with our
partners to secure projects that
will help reduce the nutrient levels
in our most important waterways.

Council Leader, Shaun Vincent said: "We welcome this significant progress and are pleased to lead on the establishment of this Joint Venture Company.

"The new company will sell the nutrient mitigation provided by a variety of projects such as reedbeds and tree planting which capture nutrients. This will



enable our local businesses to start building the new homes we need."

Planned housing growth is vital for our district. It provides new homes for people who want to move to the area and for local people who want to stay in the district where they grew up. Building new homes also provides jobs and helps support our local economy.

New sports hub in Brundall

With a loan of more than £230,000, Broadland District Council has accelerated the development of a brandnew community hub.

The money has helped pay for the early delivery of a multi-sport, floodlit 3G pitch and a community building capable of hosting numerous sports clubs and teams.

The facility will provide an opportunity to promote inclusivity by hosting activities and coaching sessions that will suit all ages and abilities. The hub will be home to both men and women's football teams and will have walking

football sessions to encourage those with limited mobility to stay active.

Council Leader, Shaun Vincent said: "It is important that our communities see the benefits of local housing growth as soon as possible. By unlocking projects like the sports hub in

Brundall, the Council is making sure that infrastructure projects that benefit communities can be delivered alongside or even before new houses are built."

The sports hub will also offer sports camps during the holidays and supervised "pay and play" schemes throughout the day and evening.



Voter ID needed to vote in-person

The Electoral Commission

The government has introduced a requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station at elections. This new requirement will apply for the first time in England at the local elections on Thursday 4 May 2023.

Which forms of ID can I use to vote?

You may already have a form of photo ID that is acceptable. You can use any of the following:

- Passport
- Driving licence (including provisional licence)
- Blue Badge
- Certain concessionary travel cards
- Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme)
- Biometric immigration document
- Defence identity card
- Certain national identity cards

If you don't have an accepted form photo ID

Most people will already have the required photo ID (see list). If you don't have an accepted form of ID, or you're not sure whether your photo ID still looks like you, you can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate. You can apply for this at voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk.

Alternatively, you can complete a paper application form and send this to our electoral services team.





Help Hub

Here to help

Broadland have been pioneering a new approach to supporting our most vulnerable residents.

We have led the way, bringing together partners from across the public and voluntary sector, to improve health and wellbeing outcomes and to get involved earlier to prevent issues escalating.

The Help Hub works with 34 partners providing 70 services, all working together to provide help for our residents at the time they need it and when the help will do the most good.

The success of our early help approach has been based on a coordinated 'no wrong door' ethos. Healthcare professionals and front-line staff can quickly and easily access wrap around support for residents - at the time it will have the biggest impact.

This approach benefits residents of all ages, allowing access to a range of health and social care resources while also offering valuable and much needed support for carers.

The Help Hub has received over 20,000 referrals in total since it launched but we know that there are vulnerable people in our communities who find it difficult to ask for help. That is why we do not just wait for people to come to us.

Our Community Connectors have brought the Help Hub services to over 1,500 people in Broadland this year, assisting with problems ranging from debt and benefits issues to housing and domestic abuse.

Community Connectors do the majority of their work based in GP surgeries, taking referrals from the clinical staff.

It has been estimated that 20% of patients go to their GP with problems that are not medical.

Community Connectors seek to alleviate some of the pressures on the NHS by addressing these non-medical needs. They look at the underlying causes of problems and offer tangible help and support.

Our Community Connectors are 'local people' working at a grass root level, using local knowledge, to help residents access the support they need. They are based in the community and meet residents in informal settings - the school playground, libraries and community groups - are a trusted link to our health and social care services.



We also have staff based at the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital, helping people get home as soon as possible. It is often the small things that can delay a patient's discharge; a house needing cleaning, a key safe to be fitted, alarms and equipment to be installed.

The District Direct team can quickly address these issues allowing people to leave hospital.

Over 1,300 referrals have been received this year with 13,000 bed days saved. The team has been so successful that the NHS has funded an expansion to the team, from four to 10, to meet increased demand.

We are now working in the Emergency Department at the hospital, an area which is under significant strain.

This directly helps the NHS by preventing unneeded admissions and speeding up discharges.

Don't miss out

We know that finances are stretched for many households right now. Fuel price hikes and cost of living increases have seen many families struggling to cover their outgoings.

At Broadland District Council the Household Support Fund has already distributed £230,000 and supported over 1,150 households to address financial hardship, but it comes to an end on 31 March. There is still a limited pot of money available and we want to ensure it reaches those who need it most.

The Household Support Fund provides grants to address severe financial hardship generated by rising costs of living. It can support residents with essential costs such as energy, heating oil, water bills and other household bills.

Leader of the Council, Shaun Vincent said: "We don't want any of our residents to be in financial difficulty when there is still assistance available.

If you are struggling to pay for your household bills, please contact us and we may be able to help. Funding ends soon and I would hate for any resident to miss out on this valuable help because they applied too late, so please act now."

The welfare of our residents is a priority for the Council and since the start of the Norfolk Warm Homes programme in 2018, our team have been delivering grants for heating and energy efficient works for fuel poor households on behalf of all Norfolk Councils.

Initial funding from National Grid, sparked the delivery of over 600 new central heating systems as well as providing grants to 80 low-income households to pay for boiler and central heating repairs or replacements.

Alongside this work our team has also secured over £2 million of financial benefits and savings to support low income and fuel poor households.

The success of this project has been achieved through the collaborative work of Norfolk Councils together with our social housing partners, landlords and non-profit organisations.

Portfolio Holder, Councillor Fran Whymark said: "The project is a great example of partners coming together to achieve incredible results for our residents. Over the last five years we have raised over £6 million in grant funding to keep people warm."

That money has been used to deliver:

- 210 Air Source Heat Pumps
- 412 First Time Gas, Oil, LPG central heating grants
- 133 Loft/Cavity and Solid Wall Insulation Grants
- 24 High Heat Retention Storage Heaters

Norfolk Warm Homes has received over 3,000 enquiries, providing residents with energy efficiency grants as well as offering vital energy saving advice.

The Council is continuing to deliver insulation and renewable air source heat pumps, encouraging a shift away from boilers to low carbon heating and energy efficient improvements. This supports our commitment to Net Zero by 2050.

Over the last five years we have helped increase the thermal efficiency and comfort of hundreds of homes while striving to improve the health and wellbeing of our residents.

Congratulations to the 11 grassroots projects that have shared almost £10,000 in funding from the Sustainability Fund. The successful projects were chosen for their exemplary initiatives to support their local communities and protect the environment in Broadland.

This Sustainability Fund was launched in April 2022 to help, projects that make a positive and sustainable difference with long-term social and environmental benefits for our local communities.

The successful projects included:

- Scrapbox, a charity in Reepham which reclaims waste materials from local businesses, commerce and individuals which would otherwise end up in landfill. These are repurposed as resources for art and crafting activities within the local community.
- The Papillon project, an educational charity that promotes sustainable living and environmental awareness for young people, through secondary schools and sixthform colleges. In 2023 they will be teaching students how to grow their own food.
- The Conservation Volunteers, who work with Broadland District Council to provide practical tasks and leadership training for community groups that look after green spaces across the district.

From tiny seeds

As trees grow they store carbon, increase biodiversity and are beneficial to our health. We have funded community tree planting projects and had our first free tree giveaway. Over **15,000** trees have been planted so far!



Forensic insight

We have compiled a very detailed analysis of our carbon emissions – meaning we can be laser-focussed on making a tangible difference.



Fuelling the future

We have switched the fuel in our waste vehicles from diesel to Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil. This will show a huge reduction on our future carbon footprint reports, approximately 1,000 tonnes per year.



Shining a light

We own and operate **500** street lights across the district. We have a comprehensive program for maintaining and improving the energy efficiency of these lights. To date, **65% of our street lights** have been fitted with LED bulbs and by the end of 2023 we will have upgraded all of them. This will significantly reduce energy usage and will decrease carbon emissions by **11** tons per year.



Green investment

We have secured funding for a hugely ambitious decarbonisation initiative – bringing green investment into our district and reducing reliance on expensive fossil fuels. Bringing us even closer to becoming carbon neutral.



Always innovating

We have received funding for a cuttingedge innovation project by partnering with The Local Government Association, University College London, and the University of East Anglia – it will focus on storing carbon and increasing biodiversity on our green sites.



Green loans

We are launching a Green Loans scheme offering Broadland homeowners interest free loans to install renewables or energy saving technologies. Homeowners can borrow up to £5,000 over 3 years, the loans can be used for insulation, heat pumps, solar panels and more.



A practical helping hand

The Council understands the importance of helping our elderly residents to stay in their own homes for as long as possible and sometimes a small change can make a big difference.

Our Handyperson+ scheme supports people over 65 and our more vulnerable residents with a wide range of small household repairs and minor adaptation work. The team is skilled, fully trained and insured for the service they provide.

The Handyperson+ service can provide both practical and advisory support to residents. Our team can help with many tasks including fitting key safes, fall prevention adaptions, smoke alarms, grab rails and better lighting. The team can also offer advice on staying warm during cold weather.

As well as small works, our handyperson will chat to residents during a visit to see if they would benefit from any additional help.

They have an in-depth knowledge of grants and allowances that are available and services a resident may be eligible for.

In addition, the team can direct residents to relevant community support, including social clubs or events in the local area if loneliness is an issue. Residents over the age of 65 can apply and you can also apply if you:

- are registered blind
- receive an Incapacity Benefit
- receive Personal Independence Payment (PIP) or Disability Living Allowance (DLA)

The hourly charge of the handyperson service is £17.90.



This does not include the cost of any materials. You might not have to pay this charge if you receive:

- Attendance Allowance
- Council Tax reduction (not including single person discount)
- Housing Benefit
- Guaranteed Pension Credit

Broadland's Bin Collections app

Almost 5,000 residents have already downloaded Broadland District Council's bin collection app since it was launched.

The new app helps us improve the service we offer to our residents. Keeping you informed about your bin collections, which bin to put out and on what day.

The app also gives advice on recycling with information about what can and what cannot go in your recycling bin. This helps us maximise the amount of waste that is successfully recycled and helps cut down on contaminated loads. If just one bin on a round is contaminated with a used nappy the contents of the lorry can be rejected at the recycling centre.

Broadland District Council's Cabinet Member for Environment,

Judy Leggett, said: "I'm delighted to see so many residents making use of our app. This is a really easy way for our residents to receive up-to-date information about waste and bin collection, which is particularly handy for bank holidays. Having this platform where you can receive information in one place is a great way to keep residents updated and help us push forward with our environmental targets."

The app displays the bin collection days for your address, notifies you of updates or disruptions with bin collections. You can also set yourself a reminder to put your bins out and play a waste sorting game.

Food waste collections powering ahead

It has been three months since we expanded the food waste service to all households in Broadland and the uptake has been fantastic - thank you.

We have collected over 1,000 tonnes of food waste, double the amount compared for the same 3 month period last year. In the first month alone we collected enough to generate electricity to power 30 average UK homes for one year.

We want to thank residents for using the service, please remember no amount of food waste is too small. Unavoidable food waste like your vegetable and fruit peelings, bones, egg shells and teabags. It means they will go on to generate electricity and fertiliser for farming.

We provide free biodegradable liners. When you need more, just tie a liner to your caddy and we'll top you up.



Care about Broadland

Keeping Broadland looking clean and tidy is something that the Council takes very seriously and we are asking for your help to make sure that our district is always looking its best.

Fly-tipping and littering have a negative impact on our environment and on human health, there is also a significant cost to taxpayers in having fly-tipped waste removed.

Many of the fly-tipping cases reported to us are caused by residents using unlicensed or rogue waste collectors.

All householders have a legal obligation to take reasonable measures to ensure that their waste is disposed of properly. A householder could be fined up to £5,000 if they pass their waste to an unauthorised person and this waste is then illegally dumped.

People can also be fined for dumping goods outside of charity shops and at recycling centres when the bins are full.



How to comply with householder's duty of care

If you are arranging for anyone other than Broadland District Council to collect any waste from your home:

 Ask to see their waste carrier licence issued by the Environment Agency. Anyone removing waste from your property must have a licence. To check a licence you can contact the Environment Agency on 08708 506506.

- Ask what is going to happen to your waste. You have a duty of care to take reasonable steps to prevent someone dumping your waste unlawfully.
- A legitimate professional waste carrier who wants your business should not object to being asked reasonable questions.
- Record the vehicle registration number of any vehicle used by a private waste carrier to take your waste away. If waste is found dumped illegally and traced back to you, investigators will have more information to trace the culprits.

 Ask for a proper invoice and receipt and get more than one quote. An unusually low quote, or an offer to take rubbish away for free in order to profit from any scrap metal that may be among it, should be treated with suspicion. Residents have ended up paying again to have their fly-tipped waste removed and disposed of correctly.

It is a Council priority to make sure that our environment is protected but we need the help of our communities to keep Broadland looking the best it can be at all times.

Helping to make a positive difference



Council Leader Shaun Vincent explained "Last year, we supported hundreds of community projects, bringing people together and helping to make a positive change. The Council gave grants totalling £25,000 and these are just a few examples of the projects we helped".

Members Ward Grant

First Responders in Sprowston received two Member Ward Grants totalling £1,000 from Cllrs Judy Leggett and Ian Moncur.

The community first responders are volunteers who are trained to attend emergencies. Their aim is to reach potential life-threatening situations in the vital first minutes.

Their role is to help stabilise the patient and provide the appropriate care until the more highly skilled ambulance crew arrives on scene to take over the treatment.

The two £500 grants were used to purchase additional resources so that the First Responders have two fully equipped First Responder kit bags.

The Eastern England Ambulance Service supplied the items including; oxygen cylinders airways, dressings and tourniquets. Previously the First Responders, who cover the 8,500 household in Sprowston, had to share one kit bag. Now, thanks to the grant from our members they have two.



Get it Started

Aslake community greenhouse in Sprowston received a Get it Started Grant for £300.

The gardening group that has been going for six years needed some extra support after the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic and the summer drought.

The group has two greenhouses and some small growing plots with 10 volunteers, ranging from teenagers to 83 years old.

The grant was used to improve accessibility, providing raised flower beds and installing lighting. The ventilation and heating was also improved in the greenhouses so they could have a dual use as a meeting space.

Keep It Going

Taverham Day Care Centre received a Keep It Going Grant of £300. This was to meet the costs of providing DBS checks for their 13 volunteers and two paid staff.

Taverham Day Care Centre provides care facilities and a hot meal for about 30 elderly and vulnerable residents in Taverham and the surrounding villages. The centre is a great place for people to socialise and make new friends. They offer activities including, gentle exercise, a library, bingo, computer training sessions and day trips.

Sports Grant

Henry Mann who is 14 and a member of the Norwich Swans Swimming Team has received a £300 Broadland Sports Grant to support his passion and talent for the sport.

Henry's dream is to compete in the English and British Nationals swimming competitions. He carries out dedicated training seven days a week around school and the weekends.
