The £750,000 annual savings can be reinvested to improve the services that really matter to you and importantly, at a time of rising prices, help us keep council tax low for everyone.

It is not just our address that has changed. The challenges facing all of us have also changed and just as we have always done, we will respond to those challenges, helping individual families with the cost of living crisis and the difficulties caused by rising inflation.

Following the election the new Council has made a new

commitment to promoting healthy and active lifestyles, growing the economy and protecting the local and global environment by championing the importance of energy transition.

### Drive to go green

We have upgraded and doubled the amount of electric charging points available in our market towns.

There are now 38 bays across market town car parks in Wymondham, Long Stratton, Loddon, Diss and Harleston.

The 22 kW fast chargers now accept contactless payment and have a more sophisticated dynamic load balancing system, which effectively distributes the charging rate according to the vehicle's capacity and state of charge.

All the bays are now painted green, and a more robust barrier will help prevent damage to the chargers as vehicles drive into the bays.

Cabinet Member, Cllr Graham Minshull, said: "We were one of the first district councils to install fast chargers in our car parks, and the network not only provides a service to shoppers and visitors, but also allows residents who don't have home charging capability to enjoy the benefits of electric vehicle ownership."



## Funding for new village hub



We have agreed a £500,000 grant towards a new pavilion on the playing field site, in Stoke Holy Cross.

The money comes from the Council's Co-Investment Grant Fund which was set up in 2022 to encourage and support the delivery of large-scale infrastructure projects, alongside growth in our parishes and towns. The scheme is designed to help secure the delivery of projects that benefit the local and wider community by providing match funding.

The new pavilion will provide recreational and community space, enable the extension of the growing pre-school, and create a thriving hub in the centre of the village.

A feasibility study for the project was produced by FMG Consulting using funding from the Council's Pride in Place Community Grant, part of the Shared Prosperity Fund.

## **Marking the Coronation**

To help residents celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III, we awarded 69 grants to support Town and Parish Councils to organise community events.

All over the district, hundreds of people joined in the celebrations during the special Bank Holiday weekend. The funding was spent on live music, afternoon teas, street parties and much more to mark this very special event.

Church Farm Shop in Hethersett won our 2023 South Norfolk Retailer of the Year Award, as voted for by our residents.

to know just how much we are valued in the community."

Jake and his family have been running Church Farm Shop since 2008.

He said: "All our produce is fresh and delicious and sourced as close to the shop as possible and we try and support as many other local businesses as we can.

"Our shelves are stocked with fresh fruit and veg, tasty homemade bakes, local ice cream, pizza, fish and so much more! If you haven't been to see us yet, come and give us a try!"

Cabinet Member, Cllr Lisa Neal, said: "We have some excellent Farm Shops in South Norfolk that are all worth exploring. When you buy from a farm shop, you're not just getting delicious, quality products straight from the farm

We have been working with wildlife habitat experts Wildside to build a nature trail at East Hills Woods in Costessey that will inspire and engage children of all ages and abilities.

The trail includes a series of bespoke wildlife sculptures that encourage children to engage with their surroundings and use their imagination.

Tim Page, the owner of Wildside is the creator of our two outside classroom and learning spaces, one of which can be found in





East Hills Wood. The other is at Queen's Hills Community Park, which is used daily by Queen's Hill Primary School and regularly visited by the local community.

Tim created the new trail from trees that have had to be felled because they were dangerous. Sometimes Tim even uses the whole tree.

All the sculptures have a wildlife theme and include millipedes,

dragonflies, beetles, hedgehogs, frogs, alligators and even a dragon. The sculptures can be climbed on, sat on or just looked at, whatever takes your fancy.

East Hills Woods is a fantastic place to visit and is being brought back to life by a group of volunteers, using old woodland management techniques to improve the age structure of the woods and biodiversity.

Business in the Community Award: Thurlton Community Shop



This small local shop is the hub of the village of Thurlton. They have over 30 volunteers that work tirelessly to support their community. They recently set up a 'warm hub' offering free hot drinks, a warm space and Wi-Fi access for those in need. The scheme also allows local writers and artists to have a space to sell and display their work, leading to an even greater community atmosphere. The volunteers also run the Good Neighbourhood's scheme offering help and assistance for those that are unable to attend doctor's or hospital appointments.

Their services include therapeutic support, massage treatments, dietary and nutritional advice.

Young Hero of the Year: Chloe Francis



Chloe, aged 16, is a member of the Wymondham Community Outreach Team, a group of volunteers that support vulnerable residents in the town. They run a variety of food and clothes banks and delivery services. Since joining the group three years ago, Chloe has become an integral and hard-working member of the team. Her fellow volunteers constantly sing her praises and are amazed the levels of kindness and compassion she shows the residents they support.

Inspiration of the Year: Peter Bee and Glynn Jordan



Peter and Glynn have gone above and beyond to support families affected by the war in Ukraine. These two friends of forty years began fundraising and collecting donations in their local town, Harleston. The pair drive the donations the 1,300-mile trip to Lviv themselves, requiring a security escort from the locals for the last part of the journey. They have travelled to Ukraine on four occasions with donations and aid.

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


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



# Millions of pounds to help homeowners save energy

Working with our Norfolk Warm Homes partners, we have successfully secured £3.4 million of Government funding to improve the energy efficiency of privately owned homes in Norfolk.

Grants of up to £38,000 are available to low income households that are off the mains gas grid for improvements such as loft and wall insulation, air source heat pumps and solar panels.

The energy efficient measures will reduce homeowners' carbon emissions, helping the UK meet its 2050 net zero target.

All grants are subject to survey, the home's suitability for works and the Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) rating.

Eligible properties must be privately owned and have an EPC rating of D, E, F or G.



To qualify for funding, home owners should have a gross annual household income of £31,000 or less, or £20,000 after paying mortgage or rent, or be an owner-occupier in receipt of means tested benefit. Landlords will need to contribute a minimum of 1/3 of the total costs.

## Helping first time buyers

A new scheme has been launched to help first time buyers get a foot on the property ladder.

The First Homes scheme is a government initiative that offers eligible first-time buyers the chance to buy new, affordable, energy efficient homes in their local area at a discount of at least 30% of the market value.

The scheme is designed to help local residents remain in the areas where they grew up and enable them to stay close to family and friends. Using the First

Homes scheme can also help by lowering the amount of deposit needed and by helping to make mortgages more affordable too.

To be eligible for the scheme you must be: 18 or older, a first-time buyer, able to get a mortgage for at least half the price of the home and have a total household income of no more than £80,000. Priority will also be given to people who already live or work in the South Norfolk area, essential workers and members of the armed forces.

Every home that is sold is valued by an independent surveyor to make sure the discount is based on actual market value. The cost of the house is also capped at £250,000, after the 30% discount has been taken off.

When it comes time to move on, the house can only be sold to someone who is eligible to buy a First Home. They must be given the same percentage discount, based on the home's market value at the time of sale.

These first homes were delivered as part of a pilot scheme.

# Funding opens doors for local families

Two vacant homes that were heading for auction have been transformed into modern affordable accommodation for local families.

Working with Saffron Housing Trust, we contributed over £80,000 to renovate the three bedroom properties, in Wymondham and Stoke Holy Cross. Saffron put another £36,000 towards the work.

Both homes benefited from a complete overhaul, including energy efficient measures, which took the EPC rating from D to A and will ensure low running costs for tenants.

Works included a new roof, new doors and windows, solar panels, insulation under the floor and a complete refit of the kitchens and bathrooms.

Cabinet member, Cllr Kim Carsok said: "We understand how important it is for people to have an affordable home that is safe and warm. Investing in these properties has brought two previously derelict homes back into use and enabled two families to have a key to their own front door."



Wymondham and Diss have been declared 'Mindful Towns' as part of our project to support people suffering with mental health issues in the district.

We have worked with partner organisations to provide free training sessions as part of the Mindful Towns and Villages project (MTVP), enabling people in the towns to become certified Wellbeing Champions.

The project ensures that immediate support is available in the community and in the workplace while raising awareness of mental health issues and challenging the associated stigma.

Cabinet Member, Cllr Kim Carsok, said:
"No one should have to face mental health issues alone. Our initiative encourages a compassionate, understanding and supportive community that are well equipped to provide care, empathy, and practical support to those who need it."

We are working with the Norfolk and Suffolk Foundation Trust's Wellbeing Service and workplace health provider Thriving Workplaces to train the towns' new Wellbeing Champions, with funding from the Department of Health's Health and Wellbeing Board.

Our Help Hub is supporting all of the newly created Wellbeing Champions, including Councillor Suzanne Nuri-Nixon (pictured) and the Help Hub has recruited a Mental Health Support Worker to talk through residents' concerns and provide advice on next steps, and the different services available.

All organisations that take part in the Mindful Towns and Villages Project will receive branding that shows they're certified, in recognition of their commitment and training.
