In September, our teams hit the streets of Broadland to encourage people to offer homes to Ukrainians, who were already in the area and looking for new hosts.

The roadshows took place across the market towns within the district, providing more information on what's involved in hosting families and individuals through The Homes for Ukraine scheme set up by the government.

Our Chairwoman, Caroline Karimi-Ghovanlou, said: "Some settled Ukrainians are looking to move on from their original hosts. They have been living in the UK for around 18 months, many have jobs and are well integrated into community life.

"The support our residents have offered has been amazing. These people have lost almost everything and to offer them a home and a chance to rebuild their lives is an incredibly generous thing to do."

If you have empty accommodation to house Ukrainian families, you could receive £500 tax free a month, with no implications to your benefits.

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Meet our Chairwoman

Cllr Karimi-Ghovanlou, who represents Taverham North, became a district councillor in 2019.

She started her career in architecture, after being only one of two women on a four-year building course at college. Her first job was as an Architectural Technician at Feilden & Mawson Architects, which is one of the reasons Caroline is so passionate about the Council's Design and Enhancement Awards.

She said: "I left to start a family and eventually went back to part-time work in retail when



my youngest was two years old, ending up as Store Secretary in the newly-opened House of Fraser."

Her next move was to Norfolk & Norwich University Hospital as Directorate PA, before she left to help look after her disabled grandson. It was at this point she became interested in becoming a councillor.

"I've always enjoyed being part of my community", reveals Caroline, "and when I heard my local parish was updating a playground near my home, I talked to one of the district councillors and asked for an accessible roundabout; there were no places my wheelchairbound grandson could play in the local area.

"On hearing that the parish wanted to update a much larger playground, I decided to join the parish council so I could be a voice for SEN children and include items that would be suitable for disabled children.

"In 2019, I was approached to stand for District Council, and was completely amazed when I was elected. I try to use my voice to highlight disability needs in the district, especially where planning is concerned."

Every Chairperson chooses a charity that they raise funds for. Caroline has chosen The Hamlet Children's Centre and Vision Norfolk (Young People and Families).

She said: "They are very personal to me as my grandson attends both. They support families with disabled children and have been invaluable to many as a place for children to go, who would not otherwise socialise and be able to join 'normal' activities."

When she's not working or spending time with her family, Caroline can often be found at the local garden centre.

"Taverham or Aylsham are my favourites," she confides, "and I often pop into Aylsham for the delicious pastries at Bread Source, or lunch at The Black Boys, and then browse in the many charity shops for a bargain. Another favourite destination is the picturesque village of Heydon."

Business Builder helps over 200 entrepreneurs

Since we launched our Business Builder scheme last year, we have helped over 200 businesses secure grants totalling almost £700,000.

This investment has accelerated growth and supported start-up companies, creating jobs and boosting the local economy.

Alongside investment, business owners have also been able to access advice and training, tailored around each business and its specific needs.

Cabinet Member for Economic Development, Martin Booth, said: "For many entrepreneurs, taking the next step in growing a business can be challenging. Lack of funds or a gap in knowledge or skills can put a stop to the best of plans. This is where Business Builder can make a difference. Yolanda Wetteland, founder of trii, a sustainable and solid body-care brand, received a Build Up Grant via the scheme,



and she said: "The grant meant I could book a digital marketing consultant to optimise my website in terms of product presentation and customer experience. It's made my website more professional and, really importantly, appropriate for a luxury brand. Critically, this all happened just as I was starting to pitch my trii range to online retailers — and I know that the website played a major part in landing these new contracts, so the timing worked out perfectly. The Business Builder grant made a significant and critical difference to my business, exactly when I needed it."

People looking to launch a business, but don't know where to start, can also get help through the scheme. Our team can work out if the business is viable and provide a free in-depth online training course which covers everything a first-time entrepreneur needs to know. Once established, they can come back and apply for a Build-Up Grant to take the next step.

For rural businesses, the Rural England Prosperity Fund has also provided a welcome pipeline of significant grants to assist investment in capital equipment, with all applications going though Business Builder.

The company which specialises in producing luxury gluten-free and dairy-free cakes and bakes was founded in 2015 by Helen Adshead, when she spotted a gap in the market.

She said: "I spent years not being able to enjoy celebrations, because I couldn't eat the food, or didn't enjoy the gluten-free and dairy-free alternatives on offer."

Applying her biochemistry background and working with professional chef and close friend Daniel, they set about developing and testing cake recipes. Soon they were producing a popular and ever-expanding range of delicious high-quality 'free from' cakes and bakes.

Helen said: "This is such an exciting step for our business. It's ideal as we are constantly innovating, and developing new bakery products that are both gluten-free, dairy-free and, most importantly, so delicious that everyone loves them regardless of their dietary needs. The Centre will give us the professional space to test new ideas and produce much greater volumes to meet our orders."

Our Cabinet Member, Cllr Martin Booth, said: "Giving local businesses the space to grow and to be in a position where they can expand their product line is at the heart of our ambition for the project. I welcome Helen, Daniel and her team to the Centre and wish them huge success for the future."

The £11.4m Broadland Food Innovation Centre is a business hub for new and growing food and drink enterprises. Developed by Broadland District Council, it opened in September 2022 and consists of 13 food-grade units, sensory tasting facility and test kitchens and meeting spaces. Other tenants include Farmyard Frozen, PrepKing, Old Rectory Preserves and Norfolk Spirits Company.

Norwich Door To Door's Funding and Community Engagement Manager, Kathleen Shirley, said: "Funds raised ensure our buses get out on the road and that beneficiaries remain actively involved in their communities. By getting people out of their homes, the charity helps relieve loneliness, improves wellbeing and encourages independence."

Taverham Band's Jim Hamshaw, said: "During the pandemic, the band was, effectively, 'mothballed' for

almost two years.
The lottery has helped
greatly in the short
term, by way of 'keeping

the lights on' as far as continuing outgoings were concerned when engagement income was nil."

Slow Food Aylsham Chair, Patrick Prekopp, said: "Lottery funding has enabled us to create two recipe books for foodbank users, and afford to print more of them to help people cook simple, healthy food."

As well as receiving 50% of the profits from tickets they sell, they also receive marketing materials and get their own Community at Heart Lottery web page.

Broadland's Community at Heart Lottery gives players the chance to win weekly cash prizes up to the £25,000 jackpot for just £1 per ticket. 50% of the £1 ticket goes directly to a good cause of the player's choice and a further 10% goes to the Council's Keep It Going grant funding pot, which supports not-for-profit projects that bring communities together and may be facing barriers to sustain themselves due to the rising costs of living.


Christmas cards and envelopes



Do recycle if made of paper.

Don't recycle if covered in glitter or foil.

Dispose of these in your rubbish bin.



Do remove all tags, bows, ribbons and Sellotape and try the 'scrunch test'. If it stays in a ball once scrunched it can go into your recycling bin.

Don't put it in recycling if it doesn't stay scrunched, pop it in your rubbish bin. If it's glittery or has foil on it, it can't be recycled.

Christmas crackers

Do separate your crackers out once you've used them. Any cardboard and paper can be recycled, if they don't have glitter or foil on them.

Don't put other items in the recycling bin, such as plastics, ribbons, any foil or glittery card, these need to go in your rubbish bin.

Food waste and vegetable peelings

Do put all cooked and raw food leftovers, peelings and cores into your food waste caddy.

Don't put any oils, liquids, food packaging, cling film or foil into your food waste caddy.

Food and takeaway plastic and foil containers

Do rinse any plastic food trays, pots, and foil containers and put them in your recycling bin.

Don't put dirty, food-stained containers in the recycling bin.

Glass bottles for water, drinks and wine

Do rinse glass bottles and jars, put the lids on, and put them in your recycling bin.

Don't put wine or drinking glasses, or broken glass into recycling. It should be carefully wrapped and placed in your rubbish bin or taken to your nearest recycling centre.



Do use our weekly collection service to dispose of old electricals and batteries on your rubbish and recycling bin collection day.

Don't put any electrical items or batteries in your rubbish or recycling bin. This can cause fires.

Funding on the double



We have doubled our Ward Members' grant funding to £1,000 and, in addition, created a Community Grant Scheme (CGS) panel to enable Councillors to each award between £1,000 and £15,000 to community groups.

Cllr Steve Riley, Cabinet Member for Finance, proposed these changes over the summer. He said: "We are committed to empowering communities and promoting positive change from the ground up. I'm delighted that we will be able to better help community-led projects flourish and make a lasting difference in the lives of our residents."

Members' Ward grant funding is available now to community projects – search 'Broadland Member grant' on our website for details of how to apply.

Successful recent applications include 1st Sprowston Brownies, who received £445 from Cllr Martin Booth to purchase outside games equipment as well as crafting, cooking and sewing equipment and materials.

Cllr Booth, said: "Sprowston Brownies offer girls a space where they can grow in confidence, feel supported, have fun and experience adventures, as well as developing new skills. This grant has helped them to expand what they offer without asking cashstrapped families for more."

Reedham Community Association was recently awarded £500 to buy portable speakers for outdoor events, with a grant supplied through Cllr Grant Nurden. These were recently used at the Bonfire Night celebration and outdoor productions from RCA Theatre Company.

Cllr Lisa Starling used her £1,000 ward funding to improve facilities at 1st Horsford and St Faith's

Scouts. She said: "The toilets were at least 20 years old and not suitable for people with disabilities. The kitchen was not user-friendly; now they're able to add sinks and draining boards, as well as improve cupboard space."

Sprowston Youth Engagement Project's Urban Adventure Garden (UAG) project has benefitted from £498 thanks to Cllr Ken Leggett. This green space helps hard to reach young people who are at risk of anti-social behaviour. Cllr Leggett said: "Our grant helps them use more of the site and deliver positive activities."

With our new CGS, your local district councillors can access between £1,000 and £15,000 for you – just contact them to make the application for funding. The CGS Panel will meet to consider requests.

You can find your local district councillors' contact details on our website.

If you think you could benefit from being more physically active, you can be referred to our longrunning Broadly Active scheme by any health care professional via a new service called Active NoW.

Active NoW is an NHS-funded centralised service covering all of Norfolk and Waveney.

You're eligible to be referred to Active NoW if you have a stable long-term health condition that could be managed or improved by being more active, or you are physically inactive (less than 30 mins of moderate intensity exercise per week). Once referred, you'd be contacted to discuss

your health, wellbeing, lifestyle, and the various exercise options suitable for your individual needs. Referrals take just two weeks.

Our Cabinet Member, Cllr Natasha Harpley, said: "This coordinated approach makes the exercise referrals process more consistent. Active NoW makes it simpler for us to improve physical activity levels for residents who could most benefit from being more active."

One local resident said: "The referral worked seamlessly from Active NoW to starting with Broadly Active. I felt reassured and supported ... I enjoy the exercises, have rebuilt my confidence in my body, and I have been able to return



Another participant said: "I'm very happy, the instructor is nice and she explains things well. I didn't wait long to get on the course from when my referral was made."

"Broadly Active gave me the confidence to exercise and lose weight," said Tracey from Aylsham.

"Since taking part in Broadly Active my general health has improved beyond compare and my ailments have improved. The instructors are wonderful, kind and considerate, but give you that extra little push when needed," said Veronica, fellow Aylsham resident.





On 8 October, 390 runners gathered in Aylsham to compete in the Marriott's Way 10K.

Runners of all ages and abilities lined up at the starting line before our Chairwoman Caroline Karimi-Ghovanlou fired the starting gun.

They ran along the old railway line through beautiful Broadland countryside before arriving to cheering crowds in the picturesque Reepham Marketplace.

Cllr Jan Davis, who ran on the day and has participated for the last three years said: "It was

great to see so many people taking part and as always there was a wonderful atmosphere. I'd like to thank all the volunteers who helped to make this event so special."

Cllr Karimi-Ghovanlou handed out medals to all participants and the winners trophies.

Congratulations to Carl White from Bure Valley Harriers who completed the course in 36 minutes 11.8 seconds and to Amy Clarke of City of Norwich Athletics Club who finished in 41 minutes .02 seconds.

Celebrating a decade of parkrun

In October, over 400 people celebrated Catton parkrun's 10th birthday with a fancy-dress themed event.

The council, alongside Active Norfolk, provided the start-up funding and supported the creation of the weekly 5k run in Catton Park which originally boasted ex-Olympic 10,000m legend, Paul Evans as co-Event Director.

Over the past decade, there have been 454 events. 12,637 finishers have completed the course 126,513 times with 1,333 different volunteers supporting them.

Our Chairwoman, Caroline Karimi-Ghovanlou, who fired the starting gun, said: "parkruns are such a great way to keep fit and have fun, whatever your age or ability."



Old Catton and Sprowston representative Cllr Ken Leggett MBE took part and walked the course in 1hr 15 minutes. It was his 59th official parkrun – still exercising and feeling the benefits in his 90s!

Blickling also celebrated their 10th birthday in November, another popular parkrun event the council helped to establish alongside Active Norfolk.

parkrun is a global, free, weekly, timed event where anyone can walk, jog or run 5k at 9am on Saturday mornings. In Broadland, parkruns also take place in Brundall and Lingwood and there is also a junior parkrun at Blickling on Sunday mornings.

Prioritising the planet together

Broadland District Council declared a Climate and Biodiversity Emergency at its Full Council meeting on Thursday 27 July. Here we catch up with our Cabinet Member for the Environment, Cllr Jan Davis, to find out what this means for Broadland.

Cllr Davis, why has the Council declared a climate emergency?

The Council declared a Climate and Biodiversity Emergency to recognise an urgent need to act on the causes and impacts of climate change and the threats to nature.

The main cause of climate change is burning fossil fuels such as oil, gas, and coal. When burnt, fossil fuels release carbon dioxide into the air trapping the sun's heat which leads to global warming.

As a result, we see more extreme weather events like heavy storms and strong winds. Hotter and drier summers result in heatwaves and wildfires. Drought and localised flooding are seemingly contradictory impacts. It appears 2023 is set to be the hottest year on record by a significant margin.

People understand the term climate emergency, but what is a biodiversity emergency?

Biodiversity comprises animals, plants and microorganisms that support life on earth. We rely on this biodiversity to provide us with the air we breathe and the food we eat. Climate change affects our local environment which impacts directly on nature resulting in an alarming and continuing loss of wildlife and plants.

What is the Council doing to help stop climate change and what can residents do?


We can all take measures to minimise the amount of carbon dioxide and other harmful gases entering the atmosphere. As a council we have an environmental strategy to become carbon neutral, "Net Zero", by 2030. We support residents, businesses, landowners, and communities to improve the natural environment and reduce Broadland's overall carbon footprint.

Trees and hedges support wildlife, capture carbon, protect our soils, reduce flood risk, improve our physical health and mental well-being, and can create jobs. Grants of up to £1,000 are available for local hedge and tree planting projects (see opposite page).

Broadland leads the Norfolk Warm Homes Partnership which offers grants up to £38,000 to low-income households off the mains gas grid for energy efficient measures which reduce carbon emissions (see opposite page).

Interest-free loans of up to £5,000 are available to homeowners for energy efficient improvements such as solar panels, insulation, heat pumps, and double glazing. There is help and advice on our website under "Saving energy at home".

The Council recognises the urgency and further programmes are under development. We will work with residents and businesses to tackle the challenges of climate change and biodiversity loss, together.



Tree grants for a healthy future

Since September 2021, we have helped our residents plant 8,000 trees through our Tree Planting Grants.

Grants of up to £1,000 are available to communities, local businesses, farmers and individuals, looking to plant trees or hedgerows.

Cllr Jan Davis, said: "Trees and hedgerows support our wildlife and reduce carbon dioxide, they can also support people's wellbeing and enhance the appearance of the district."

Our Community Tree Planting Grants for community groups, town and parish councils and charities can fund the cost of trees, planting, fencing, tree guards and aftercare, with projects that plant a large proportion of saplings preferred.

Our Landowner Tree Planting Grants for local businesses, farmers and individuals, provide funding for trees and guards. The minimum project size is 25m of hedgerow or 125 trees.

Applications are welcome at any time, but trees need to be planted by the end of March to have the best chance of survival.

Funding for green home improvements

Improve your home's energy efficiency, by applying for a Home Upgrade Grant.

Grants of up to £38,000 are available for energy efficiency improvements, such as loft, cavity wall insulation and renewable air source heat pumps.

If you own your home, do not have mains gas central heating and meet one of the below criteria then you could qualify for fully funded home improvements:

- Owner-occupier in receipt of a means-tested benefit.
- Gross annual household income of £31,000 or less or £20,000 after mortgage or rent payments.

The energy-efficient measures will reduce homeowners' carbon emissions, helping the UK

towards its 2050 net zero target. All grants are subject to survey, your home's suitability and the Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) rating, which must be rated D-G.

Landlords will need to contribute a minimum of one third of the total costs.

The funding is being distributed through the Warm Homes Scheme, formed from the County's Local Authorities and led by Broadland District Council.

New homes for people at risk of homelessness

As living costs have risen, we have seen a threefold increase in people in need of temporary accommodation, often though no fault of their own. To help house those at risk and to reduce our annual costs, we have invested £2.2 million in seven new houses.

The homes off Dereham Road in Norwich will provide temporary accommodation for up to 35 people and will save us around half a million pounds per year, as we will no longer be so reliant on bed and breakfast accommodation to house residents at risk.

Our Cabinet Member, Cllr Natasha Harpley, said: "These homes will provide a refuge for people at risk of homelessness and will save the Council a significant amount of money.

"They are close to local amenities, work and education opportunities and many support services. Our fantastic team will be on-hand, as they always are, to give residents all the practical help they need, so they never have to face homelessness again."

We believe that no one should have to sleep on the streets, so we have a very robust system in place to ensure that help is always available.

The Council work hard to prevent homelessness and if they are notified of a rough sleeper, will immediately step in and offer temporary accommodation.



Meeting rooms on the Horizon

Modern business facilities are now available for hire at our new HQ at Broadland Business Park.

The Horizon building is the perfect place to host a business meeting, conference, training event or seminar for up to 100 people. Situated just off the A47 Postwick junction on the Broadland Business Park, The Horizon Building is easily accessible with plenty of free parking on site.

Our Cabinet Member, Cllr Dan Roper, said: "We have a fantastic modern building with great



facilities in an ideal location. It makes financial sense to hire out our meeting rooms when they aren't in use and it will also benefit local businesses too.

"We have rooms that can accommodate 20 to 100 people, with all the modern-day meeting facilities you'd expect and free fast wi-fi access. So if you're looking at bringing people together, then look no further than the Horizon."

There are several meeting rooms available, all accessible on the ground floor and equipped with projectors and screens enabling hybrid-meetings.

Food can be arranged with a local caterer and tea and coffee can also be provided in house. Free wireless internet access is also provided, ensuring that guests can be continually connected.

Getting builders back on site

Nutrient neutrality has had a profound impact on many parts of the country and has stalled thousands of desperately needed homes. One of the most significantly affected areas is here in Norfolk where districts have been unable to grant planning permission for new homes for the last 18 months leading to a backlog of approximately 16,000 new homes.

While it is acknowledged that the Government is continuing to seek a 'silver bullet' solution to the restrictions arising from nutrient neutrality, in this vacuum of uncertainty there is a need to deliver local solutions to re-start our growth agenda.

In response, councils in Norfolk have formed a unique partnership to address this potentially catastrophic impediment to growth. Four Councils – South Norfolk, Broadland, Breckland and

North Norfolk – have established a new joint venture company called, Norfolk Environmental Credits (NEC). The company will provide a trading platform for nutrient offsetting and other environmental credits, including Biodiversity Net Gain (BNG).

Norfolk Environmental Credits is designed to secure largescale nutrient mitigation from projects such as changes in use of agricultural land, septic tank conversion and water infrastructure enhancements, etc. These credits are then parcelled up by the company and sold to developers to offset the equivalent amount of nutrients arising from their new development.

Cabinet Member for Planning, Cllr Stuart Beadle, said: "NEC's first deal will provide credits to offset approximately 5,000 new homes and the company will prioritise the needs of SME builders to ensure they can secure much-needed cash flow. Assuming an average house price of £300k this equates to a £1.5bn initiative which will have a profoundly positive impact upon the respective districts."

Norfolk Environmental Credits has launched its new website norfolkenvironmentalcredits. co.uk, allowing housing developers to calculate their additional nutrient load and register an interest in purchasing credits as they become available. The website also provides a mechanism for landowners and interested parties to come forward with potential nutrient mitigation solutions that the joint venture may wish to invest in.





Arresting development wins top award

This year's Design and Enhancement Award winners were announced at our Community at Heart Awards on 20 October.

The new Broadland Gate Police Station took the top spot in the design category and The Lodge in Drayton scooped first prize in the enhancement category.



Chair of the Awards Panel, Cllr Caroline Karimi-Ghovanlou, said: "These awards give us the opportunity to celebrate the local expertise, hard work and vision involved in creating and restoring beautiful and functional buildings that enhance our district and protect its special character."

"As always, we received some fantastic entries of exceptional quality. We were so impressed with the attention to detail and the carbon-cutting design of the new police station, and the lodge just wowed us with its transformation that was so sympathetic to the character of the existing building – both very worthy winners."

Broadland Gate Police Station was built for Norfolk Constabulary and designed by Chaplin Farrant Architects, with the aim of bringing the local police services into a single space to create an efficient operational base. Judges were impressed with its use of quality materials, low carbon design, the use of renewable energy sources and how well it embedded into the landscape.

The Lodge at Drayton has been converted by developers Hidden Talent Homes. A significant local building built in 1914, it has been transformed into eight individual homes consisting of five apartments and three townhouses.

The conversion of the manor house also enabled the preservation works to the ruin of the original 15th century lodge in the grounds, removing it from the Buildings at Risk Register. This was overseen by conservation architect Ruth Brennan with SJ Restoration undertaking the work.

Two High Commendations were awarded in the Design category. Taverham Park Avenue built by Fleur Homes and designed by Hudson Architects impressed the judges, as did Woodland Drive, Drayton built by Beauchamp Homes and designed by A Squared Architects.

Bridgefoot Cottage built for the Salle Park Estate, designed by Hawkins Architecture with GMP Architecture overseeing the construction, was also awarded a commendation.

A High Commendation was also given in the Enhancement category with Tyby Farm and Hall View Barn developed by Sean O'Hanlon, designed by Claxton Hall Architectural Ltd., and built by Gaskin Builders Ltd.



Appealing courthouse granted reprieve



Part of a historic building in the heart of Blofield has recently been restored, thanks to a £5,000 Heritage at Risk grant.

The grant was used to restore the leaking and rotting cupola on the roof of the grade II listed Blofield Courthouse. The cupola, an important architectural feature of the building, needed to be removed from the site to be fully repaired.

Our Deputy Leader, Cllr Natasha Harpley, said: "I am delighted to see this historically significant building restored to its former glory. It's vital we retain our heritage for future generations to enjoy and this building can now continue to be at the heart of village life for many years to come."

The cupola is a roof-top feature on the courthouse which helped provide ventilation and extract the smoke when people (including the judge) smoked in the courtroom and is a key feature of the building.

The building, owned by the Parish Council, is now in use for community activities, such as fitness classes and film screenings and rooms are available to hire.

Each year, we grant aid a small number of projects. Organisations with a listed building or structure in need of repair and considered 'at risk' that could
